



Proposal made for Edson Library makeover

At the February 9 Town of Edson Committee of the Whole Meeting, a delegation from the Edson and District Public Library presented Town Council with the results of a renovation feasibility study for the facility, which was

conducted this past summer.

Library Manager Michael Baird, along with Graeme Matichuk and Richard Isaac of Manasc Isaac Architects, outlined a two-stage plan to bring the facility up to code and improve functionality. The Library Board is requesting they be allowed to begin fundraising and use their reserves to pursue a detailed design plan which would include a more accurate and complete cost analysis.

The Edson and District Public library previously proposed an expansion and major renovation in a 2012 study which was expected to cost approximately \$12 million. The new 2020 feasibility study divides the proposed renovations into short-term and medium-term probable project costs, focuses on essential upgrades and interior renovations, and has an anticipated total cost of approximately \$1 million.

The short-term renovations are ones Matichuk told Council were considered "life safety or essential." These include space changes within the existing footprint of the facility, washroom upgrades to meet accessibility requirements, and HVAC upgrades to meet current building codes.

Phase 2 of the design proposes an expansion which would convert the courtyard into a children's area.


The library was built in 1980 and at that time was designed to serve the Town of Edson which had a population of 5,671. Currently the facility is a joint use facility with Yellowhead County and, according to 2020 statistics, serves approximately 13,073 people including the Town and surrounding area.

The current library area, not including the pottery space, is 8,995 sq ft. The provincial best practices recommendation is 10,620 sq ft for Edson's current population and service area.

When factoring in the 1.2% population increase projected in the Intermunicipal Development Plan, that space requirement grows to 13,508 sq ft within the next 25 years.

The group also made a long-term recommendation, which was not fully detailed in this study, that the Library should expand into the north alley from the courtyard to fulfill the space requirement until approximately 2046. The study says, "This expansion, roughly estimated to cost \$750,000, should be pursued within the next 10 years."

Mayor Kevin Zahara said the feasibility study "ties in nicely" with the Town's Asset Management Plan. He spoke favourably of both the study and the request to begin fundraising, saying, "You've come up with something fairly reasonable," but advised that the Town would need to have conversations with their County counterparts before making any financial decisions, as it is a shared use facility.



Covid Rollercoaster...

After nearly a year on the rollercoaster of on-again-offagain Covid-19



restrictions, Albertans finally have a coherent roadmap of what conditions will facilitate the gradual reopening of businesses and public activities.

Premier Jason Kenney introduced the plan last week. It calls for four stages of reopening, with each stage tied to the number of people hospitalized with Covid-19. As hospitalization rates fall below pre-set levels, more restrictions will be eased.

The Edson and District Chamber of Commerce, along with Chambers across the province, have been voicing their concerns that the restrictions in place were having extremely negative impacts on the business community. "This has been, to say the least, an exceedingly difficult year and they feel a total lack of direction and guidance coming from the government at this moment. First and foremost is the concern of no timelines on when they will be allowed to reopen," the Chamber stated in a letter to the Premier recently.

Albertans saw the first light at the end of the tunnel when the province entered Phase 1of the plan on February 8. This included the reopening of

some school sports, team sports practice, one-on-one personal fitness

training, and albeit with restrictions —a return to tables at restaurants, cafés and pubs (as long as hospitalizations stayed below

By publicly setting out quantifiable targets, Albertans and local businesses have at least some sense of hope and a guiding map for the return to pre-pandemic life.

However (and this pandemic always seems to include a 'however'), with the spread of much more infectious strains of Covid-19 now in the province, there is no assurance or guarantee from the **Province or Premier Kenney** that a feared Spring spike in cases won't cause another even stricter lockdown.

The fact remains that we are still on a rollercoaster, just a bit more predictable one. It will continue to be extremely difficult for all of us to do any forward-looking planning or budgeting until vaccines are delivered to the province, and are in the arms of the majority of citizens.

Let's hope that happens a lot sooner, than later.

NO SPRAY PROGRAM YEARLY RENEWAL

Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires landowners who do not want herbicide applied adjacent to their property to enter into an agreement with the county prior to April 1st of each year. The landowner becomes responsible for weed and brush control in the designated areas, as defined by the no spray agreement.

If you cannot meet this deadline, please call our Agricultural Services Department at 780-325-3782 or 1-800-814-3935.

- Once an agreement has been completed no spray signs must be purchased at a cost of \$5.00 for two signs, at the Yellowhead County Edson or Wildwood Offices. These signs must be placed by the landowner in a highly visible area as close as possible to the property line.
- Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires each landowner who has signed the agreement to fulfill their obligations before the July 1st deadline. After the July 1st deadline, Yellowhead County re-assumes responsibility for weed and brush control and may apply herbicide adjacent to non-compliant roadsides if necessary.
- If you chose not to renew your agreement for 2021, we ask that you please remove your signs prior to the start of the spray season starting May 1st,

County agrees on Edson Revenue Sharing Agreement extension

Following the expiration of the Edson/Yellowhead County Revenue Sharing Agreement on December 31, 2020, County Council was given the option to enter into a two-year extension as opposed to drafting a new agreement at this time.

The idea of an extension arose during Council's January Governance and Priorities Meeting. Reasons for an extension rather than an entirely new agreement included the fact that both municipalities are hiring new CAOs, and with municipal elections coming up in October, both municipalities may have entirely new Councils.

The discussion in January led to County Administration forwarding a draft agreement to the Town of Edson for discussion and feedback. The draft agreement did include a minor revision from the original, which now states that the County may deduct a prorated portion of any uncollected non-residential taxes in the given year. In the original agreement, it was based on taxes "written off". The revised version captures the current environment better for the purposes of fairness and equity to both parties.

The Town of Edson reviewed the draft and stated their support of a two-year extension. CAO Jack Ramme brought the extension back to County Council on February 9 to be voted on.

Ramme said, "The communities have had very positive working relationships over the past number of years that the previous agreements were in place, and these agreements have assisted both parties relative to service provisions and common lobby efforts to the

Provincial Government."

Councillor Sandra Cherniawsky expressed her disagreement with a two-year extension. "I think that a one-year agreement would be a little more prudent. I think that it would give us all a chance to look at this and look at how the chips fall with the budgets, with the Province, with everything," she said. "I will not be supporting this motion."

Ramme explained the concerns with a oneyear agreement. "The only concern we saw with the one-year agreement is you're going to be politicizing it a little bit, because you're going to have to start discussions now, and ramping them up right at election time," he said. "A two-year gives the new people sitting at their respective tables a chance to get educated on the issues."

Councillor Anthony Giezen agreed with Cherniawsky's thoughts on a one-year agreement as opposed to a two-year. "I think it's very important that this topic stay a frontrunner, so to speak, for the next Council and the next Administration," he said, noting that in a year they could choose to extend for an additional year if needed.

Councillor Wade Williams spoke in favor of the two-year extension, noting that there are provisions in the agreement to terminate it in the event that the Province cuts funding. "I think we are covered with the termination portion," he said. "I think we should go with the two-year agreement for now and take a little bit of pressure off of both the new Councils."

Councillor Shawn Berry also agreed with the two-year extension, saying that he didn't want to politicize the discussions considering the upcoming election.

Ramme went on to reiterate the reasons for a

Revenue Sharing Agreement. "It was to bring political stability and fiscal autonomy to the region," he said. "It brings protection to the County and stability to our partners."

It was acknowledged that a one-year agreement would mean the new Councils alongside new Administrative leadership would have to sit down "almost immediately" to draft a new agreement.

Council voted 7-2 in favor of the two-year extension, with Councillors Cherniawsky and Giezen voting against.

RCMP presents update to Yellowhead County

At their February 9 Yellowhead County Council Meeting, Council welcomed S/Sgt. Christian Delisle from the Edson RCMP Detachment and S/Sgt. Chris Murphy from the Hinton RCMP Detachment to present an update for Yellowhead County.

Delisle said that, in 2020, the Edson Detachment received 5,533 calls for service. 1,875 of those were for the rural areas, representing 32-34% of their calls for service.

Delisle went on to discuss more specific statistics for the Edson Detachment for the year 2020. When comparing to 2019, decreases were seen in many categories.

Property crime was overall down 30%. Break and Enters saw a decrease in 41%, down to 41 incidents in 2020 compared to 69 incidents in 2019. Motor vehicle thefts were down 46%, with 38 incidents reported in 2020 as compared to 70 in 2019.

135 reports were received of suspicious

persons/vehicles/properties in 2020. This was a decrease from 2019's 210 reports

Overall, person-related crimes were down 19% from 2019. However, sexual assaults saw an increase, with one incident in 2019 and six in 2020, and other sexual offences increased from three in 2019 to six in 2020. Delisle noted that, sadly, most of these incidents were family related involving children as victims.

Other assaults were down 24%, with 39 incidents occurring in 2020. Again, most of these occurred in family/domestic situations. There were also 51 cases of reported Spousal Abuse in 2020.

Murphy said that the number of family related crimes "keeps climbing" in the Hinton Detachment as well.

Both Delisle and Murphy discussed the increased calls related to the Mental Health Act, which they partially attributed to the effects of COVID-19 isolation. From the Edson Detachment, mental health related calls went up to 51 in 2020 as compared to 37 in 2019.

Both Detachments discussed being proactive in policing and working to ensure their visibility in County areas. Police proactivity represents a large aspect of their policing priorities in 2021 and 2022.

It was also noted that the Detachments are preparing for the upcoming Summer. It is expected that the County will see another large influx of visitors looking to escape the cities.

Councillor Sandra Cherniawsky noted that a lot of visitors "don't have the same appreciation" for the areas in the County they are visiting.

Murphy said the key will be to continue to work together with other organizations, such as Fish and Wildlife, Forestry, Parks, etc., in order to remain visible and provide education to visitors. "No organization can do this by themselves," he said.

"I know that, for myself, there's nothing better than sitting at a campsite on a weekend and having a cruiser go by," said Councillor Penny Lowe. "It just gives you that sense of security that you are out there and you are available. Thank you."

Councillor Dawn Mitchell asked the officers about "random camping" and who is responsible for cleaning up some of the messes left behind. Murphy had earlier shared a story about coming up on a "disgusting" campsite that campers had just left, in which they went and got the campers, handed them some garbage bags, and said "Clean this up or get fined."

Mitchell asked, "What if they don't get caught? Whose responsibility is

Murphy said it depends on the land, but that some land use officers have previously had to send teams out to clean up debris and garbage. "That takes time, and most communities don't want to wait that long," he said. "We know what happens if we wait too long. If we don't clean it up in a timely fashion, there is just less and less respect for that area. So what starts out as a little issue can become very big very quickly." Murphy noted that he has also seen community members come together and clean up areas.

Murphy said that the biggest thing is to send the message out to others that they will be held accountable if caught. Through patrols and being aware of who is in what areas, the officers can try to catch them before they leave or have enough information to investigate and follow up after the fact. Murphy said "several" fines were issued last year, and that the fines are "quite significant."

Lastly, Council and the S/Sgts discussed communication with the community. Delisle noted that he gives out his card, his number, and his email address to people and encourages them to reach out. Town Halls are also held, although virtually for now.

Delisle noted that some residents in County areas with poor internet service were unable to attend live Zoom meetings, so a Community Engagement Survey was created to allow them to participate and make comments regarding 2021/2022 policing priorities.

Councillor Anthony Giezen said, "I think the internet survey is great. It gets the whole community involved."

The next Edson RCMP Town Hall is February 17 from 7-9pm and will be held virtually. You can register to attend on the Edson.ca website.





Secure funding for Alberta Agricultural Societies

Supporting rural volunteers and organizations throughout COVID-19.

(Minister Devin Dreeshen) Agricultural Societies serve and support our rural communities and are a rich part of Alberta's history. They provide services such as community centres, ball diamonds, rodeo grounds, curling rinks, skating rinks and so much more.

Each year they receive a provincial base grant and an additional operating grant for events at their facilities. As a result of COVID-19, most of these events did not happen, which is why Agriculture and Forestry changed the 2021-2022 funding formula and has expedited the grant process. Alberta's government will still provide an additional operating grant by calculating the previous five-year average funding per organization.

Agricultural Societies will use a streamlined form to apply, resulting in significant savings

of both time and resources. Grants will be processed this spring, starting in May, to get these much-needed funds out to dedicated volunteers across the province.
