Shandy Reichenbacher was a kind, caring, and selfless 10-year-old girl, loved by all of those around her. She sadly

passed away in 2014 not long after turning 11, following a hard-fought battle with an aggressive brain tumour.

Instead of the usual event with live music and a barbeque, Shandy's mom Barbie Brown and her family and friends invited people to participate in a drive-thru bottle drop off on June 26 at Centennial Park, where people could donate their bottles to go towards helping the Brain Tumour Foundation of Canada in honour of Shandy's Dream.

People were also invited to take a walk around the park in Shandy's memory at their own leisure instead of as part of a structured memorial walk.

Every year, Shandy's friends and family release butterflies in honour of Shandy. They were still able to do so, albeit in a "more casual" way with her school friends standing around Shandy's bench in Centennial Park.

June 26 was in the middle of our area's extreme heat wave, but even so the group said it was a "successful day." "Despite the heat we managed to come close to our goal of \$10,000 all to be donated to The Brain Tumour Foundation to fund Pediatric Brain Cancer Research," said Barbie. "It was a wonderful day."

Over the last five years, Shandy's Dream has raised close to \$125,000 for Pediatric Brain Cancer Research. This contribution was matched by the Brain Tumour Foundation, so in all almost a quarter of a million dollars has been raised in her honour.

Next year, Barbie hopes that they will be able to host their full event with the BBQ, music, Memorial Walk, and Butterfly Release. The group also plans to include a bottle drive because of the great success they saw this year, although likely on a different weekend from the main event for planning purposes.

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Much loved local nurse retires after 40+ years

Since February 5, 1981, many patients in Edson have been blessed to be treated by Barb Ludwig (nee Roy). After over 40 years of incredible service, she worked her final shift on June 29, 2021.

Barb told her three children (Yvette, Devon, and Kate) that she didn't want a big party, so they decided instead to offer the community a chance to write her messages on an online "Kudoboard". Hundreds of responses and kind messages poured in, demonstrating the effect that Barb has clearly had on so many.

"Exceptional," "compassionate," "kind," and "dedicated" were a few of the many words used to describe Barb and her work over her years. One message called her the "Florence Nightingale of present day," which may be one of the biggest compliments a nurse could ever receive.

Barb has been an Edsonite her whole life, born on October 7, 1956 to Evelyn and Marcel Roy who lived on the North Road. She graduated from a Certified Nurses Aide program in 1978, and then spent six months in an acute care unit in Jasper.

Barb then went to Whitehorse and was unable to find a full-time nursing position so she spent a year working in telecommunications before taking a maternity leave. Then, she came back home to Edson to start on a long-term care unit, where she stayed from 1981-1983.

The opportunity to move to acute care arose, and Barb decided to take it. At first, she was nervous about going back to acute care as she hadn't used those skills in a few years, but looking back she says she's glad she made the switch.

She stayed working in acute care for the remainder of her career, helping in other specialties like Orthopedics and Rheumatology along the way. Barb's special talent for working with kids resulted in her being chosen to work in Pediatrician Dr. Roseman's clinics whenever he'd travel to Edson.

The changes in the healthcare industry over the past 40+ years have been huge. Barb said that electric beds were a "big excitement" when two or three were first brought in. Before that, old crank beds were in use.

They didn't used to have CAT scans or ultrasound and were only able to use x-ray for diagnostic imaging. They also didn't have disposable needles, syringes, or thermometers. Silver mercury was used for mouth temperatures, and blue mercury was used for other readings. Supplies were soaked in alcohol and air dried, gloves were rationed, and med cups were washed and reused.

IVs were glass bottles hanging on a pole and there were no electric pumps, you had to gauge the drops per minute. And if patients needed a blood transfusion, they had to hope it wasn't on an evening or a weekend or they'd have to wait.

Barb also said they didn't have the diseases and medical knowledge they do now. Things were more "straight forward," and paperwork didn't consume as much time. "You had

time to provide proper care," she said.

Barb's starting wage was \$4.25, and over 40 years that only increased around \$30. But nursing isn't a career that's about the money – for Barb it was about the people. Barb's position has always been very patient-focused – which fits in perfectly with her skill set and personality.

Through the years she went through the titles of a CNA to a RPN Registered Nurse to an LPN Licensed Practical Nurse. As an LPN she was able to focus more on the bedside care and felt that work was more personal than shuffling papers and delegating people.

Barb "has always been a go-to nurse," said daughter Yvette. Barb would take the time to help maintain her patient's grooming habits, like cutting their hair and nails. "Lots of our waiting placement patients would end up looking like Tom Hanks in Castaway if she didn't take the time to cut hair and shave," added Yvette. Barb was also great in postpartum nursing, and was known as "the baby whisperer."

Her care and compassion didn't end with her patients. She had a special way of making people feel involved. "Collecting a glass of ice water for someone and she'll make you feel like you just finished a successful code on your own," said Yvette.

At a small celebratory dinner for her retirement, Barb's family asked her some questions about her career. They learned that she wanted to be a nurse from the time she was six years old, and that she considers being healthy and able to help someone else the most important part of nursing.

When asked what she could "do without" when it came to her job, her answer was clear: "Paperwork!" The paperwork, dynamics of staffing, and the bureaucracy were things she'd warn a future nurse about, but said that it is a "good career" and that "the work is very rewarding."

In her time, Barb has dealt with H1N1, SARS, COVID-19, Ebola, Zika virus, the Ralph Klein cutbacks, and she fought alongside others in the community when the province considered shutting down the Edson hospital. During that time, beds were cut from 50 down to 10.

Barb has also dealt with large scale accidents, such as the mass-casualty bus crash that brought around 25 people into the hospital all at once, all the while dealing with the struggles of the cutback discussions.

Barb's career has been nothing short of impressive, but the thing that stands out the most is how many lives she has clearly touched. The number of people who took the time out of their day to wish Barb well and share a story of her impact says a lot about the person she is. As her family said, "She has left the facility, but she won't be forgotten."

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Wildfire update for Edson Forest Region

Jul 5, 2021: A fire restriction remains in effect for the Edson Forest Area.

Please be cautious when working or recreating in the outdoors. Be mindful of hot exhaust, spark or friction. Keep watch of your surroundings and ensure your activities or equipment does not start

a wildfire.

If you see smoke or flame and suspect it's a wildfire, call 310-FIRE.

We would like to thank our contractors who provide us with heavy equipment. They are an important component to fighting wildfires.

NEW WILDFIRE DETECTIONS

July 4, one new wildfire was detected at 4:52 p.m. It's estimated to be 0.01 ha in size located near the Cardinal River to the

south of our Forest Area. Firefighters are currently responding to the wildfire.

There are no communities being affected by any wildfires in our forest area at this time.

Many of the recent wildfires are believed to have been caused by lightning strikes that have occurred over the past week. These types of wildfires can smoulder deep into the ground for days or even weeks and flare when the conditions

are right.

We would like to remind everyone, if you see smoke or flame in the forest, call 310-FIRE.

EWF093 and EWF094 are both located 12 km north of Cynthia and 73 km south east of Edson on the east side of highway 753. The fires are 2.5 km from each other.

EWF094 is now UNDER CONTROL and is estimated to be 1.5 ha in size. There are nine firefighters assigned to this fire.

EWF093 is now BEING HELD. This means that given current weather conditions and resources, the wildfire is not anticipated to grow past expected boundaries. The wildfire is estimated to be 54 ha in size. Today, 46 firefighters and four helicopters worked to reinforce the line and search for and extinguish hotspots. They'll continue operations tomorrow.

The wildfires pose no threat to any communities at this time. The cause of the wildfires are currently under investigation.

Government inaction has cost news publishers

News Media Canada members are calling on the federal government to introduce the long-awaited policy to allow publishers to negotiate fairly with Facebook and Google.

The recent announcement by Facebook regarding short-term commercial arrangements it has undertaken with a few Canadian media outlets underlines the need for the government to follow through urgently on the commitment it has made to curtail the predatory monopoly practices of both Facebook and Google and level the playing field for Canadian news media.

Both the Prime Minister and the Minister of Canadian Heritage have committed to legislation to rein in the web giants, who abuse their monopoly power by diverting 80% of online advertising revenues in Canada and distributing content generated by Canadian journalists without

compensation. Since October of last year, News Media Canada has called for Canada to adopt the approach enacted by the Australian Parliament, which requires the web giants to negotiate collectively with that country's news media to provide fair compensation for content.

Until news media in this country can negotiate collectively with Google and Facebook, the two multinationals will continue to divide and conquer, using their power and market dominance to drive terms that are in their favour against smaller, more financially vulnerable news media outlets. Far from contributing to the resolution of the problem, this approach only solidifies their stranglehold.

As the response of the opposition parties this week has shown, there is a broad, bipartisan consensus for action now. We call on the government to keep its commitment to Canadians who rely on local news and to introduce legislation before Parliament rises for the summer.

We're up against two Goliaths.

And we need more Davids.

Google and Facebook are using their power to scoop up 80% of online revenue generated by hardworking journalists and publishers across Canada. Other governments are standing up to the web giants and protecting local news in their countries. Parliament needs to act on their commitment to protect the future of your local news. Edson RCMP Occurrences for the week of June 28 - July 5, 2021

Between June 28 and July 5, 2021, traffic complaints topped the list of Edson RCMP investigations at 20. Other investigations included: Alarms/False Alarms 6; Assault 5; Assistance Calls 14; False/ Abandoned 911 call 2; Fraud 0; Harassment/Criminal Harassment; Lost/Found Property 2; Mischief or Damage 5; Suspicious Persons or Vehicles 9; Theft Complaints 11; Traffic Collisions 12; Trespassing 11; Uttering Threats Against Person; and Wellbeing Checks 4.

Canada Recovery Hiring Program (CRHP)

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise the launching of an online calculator to help eligible employers prepare their CRHP applications. This calculator integrates the new CRHP with the Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS), automatically showing applicants which subsidy will provide them with more support, based on the information they enter.

The CRHP and the CEWS are both based on four-week claim periods. From June 6, 2021 to September 25, 2021 (claim periods 17 to 20), the subsidies overlap so that, as CEWS rates

gradually decline, eligible employers would still be able to receive support through the CRHP if they hire more workers or increase workers' hours or wages.

For the four overlapping claim periods, eligible employers can apply for either subsidy, based on whichever subsidy provides the higher amount of support. An eligible employer must claim the greater of the CRHP

and the CEWS for a particular claim period, but not both.

Eligible employers will be able to apply for the CRHP as of July 7, 2021, when the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) will open applications through My Business Account and Represent a Client. The CRA will begin to issue CRHP payments to eligible employers during the week of July 12, 2021.

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RCMP provides fraud prevention tips to counter COVID-19 related frauds

The pandemic has led to new COVID-19 related fraud in Alberta. From March 2020 to February 2021, there were over 10,700 reports of fraud in Alberta RCMP jurisdictions.

Impersonation- and identity-related incidents accounted for 19.4 per cent of all reported frauds for that same period. The top ten frauds in Alberta RCMP jurisdiction are as follows:

1. Fraud (money/property/security) less than or equal to \$5000
2. Identity fraud
3. Fraud (money/property/security) greater than \$5000
4. Identity theft

5. Theft, forgery, misuse of credit card
6. Use/traffic/possess a forged document
7. Illegal possession or trafficking in government documents
8. Obtain food/lodging by fraud
9. Fraud, obtaining transportation
10. Unauthorized use of computer

Here are some tips to protect yourself by learning how to recognize and prevent fraud:

- Does this transaction make sense? If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is
- Ignore communication from unknown contacts
- Don't leave personal identification cards in your vehicle

- Purchase items from reputable organizations
- Research organizations via the Better Business Bureau
- Regularly monitor credit card statements for unknown or suspicious charges
- Never send money on a dating site

If you have been the victim of a fraud, report it to your local police service and to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre online at: www.antifraudcenter.ca or by calling: 1-888-495-8501. You should also contact your bank and credit card company if you believe your personal or financial information has been compromised.

The Edson 03-11-53-18 W5M Gas Plant is located southwest of the Town of Edson. The Town of Edson intersects with an Emergency Planning Zone (EPZ) of 5.79 km.

Proposed Statement:

As per the Alberta Energy Regulator's Direction 071: Emergency Preparedness and Response Requirements for the Petroleum Industry, we are providing you information regarding Repsol's Emergency Response Plan. Directive 071 outlines planning requirements for emergency response plan (ERP) development that licensees must meet in order to gain approval for the ERP, contains a corporate-level ERP and out the requirements that licensees are required to meet in order to effectively implement their plans and respond to an incident or emergency. As part of Repsol's requirements to comply with this Direction, we are sharing information with the public regarding our existing Edson Gas Plant facility at 03-11-53-18W5M, located approximately 16 km west of the Town of Edson. The ERP has three primary public safety measures outlined below.

Shelter-In-Place Procedures:

Shelter-in-place is considered the primary public safety measure when the hazard is of a limited duration or the public would be at a higher risk if evacuated. Shelter-in-place creates a protective buffer from higher (more toxic) concentrations that may exist outdoors. Shelter-in-place is most effective when the movement of outside air into the buildings is minimized. If you are instructed to stay in your residence, do not leave your house or attempt to start any vehicles until emergency response personnel advises you that it is safe to do so or until other appropriate emergency actions can be taken (such as evacuation).

Evacuation Procedures:

In the unlikely event of a long-term release, it may be necessary to evacuate you to ensure your safety. You will be contacted by emergency response personnel and will be provided with a safe route to an established evacuation centre. If there is no answer to our calls, we will proceed to your residence to ensure you are informed of the emergency.

The following steps should be taken if evacuation procedures have been implemented:

- Gather all residents and bring any medicines required
- Tightly close all windows and doors
- Turn down the thermostat and shut off any air exchange fans
- Drive safely on the route provided, proceed directly to the reception centre and check in with the Repsol representative
- Wait for further instruction

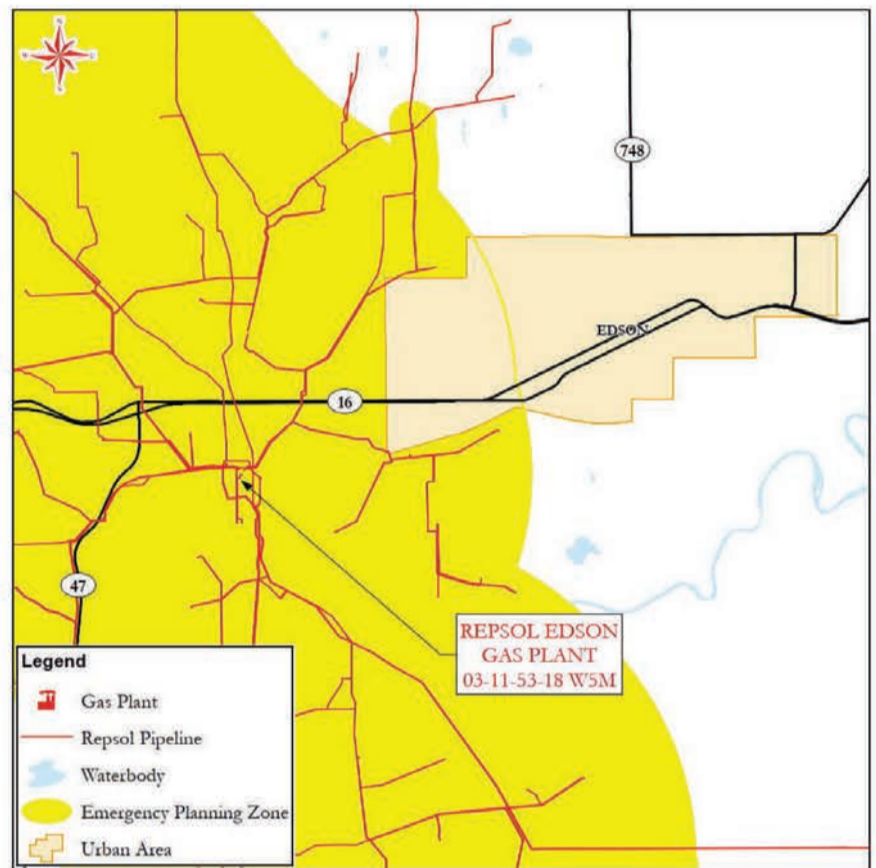
Ignition Procedures:

In conjunction with Shelter-In-Place and Evacuation strategies, the release may be ignited at the source in order to reduce your exposure to the hazard. The combustion of gases being carried high into the atmosphere allows additional time for the public to safely evacuate. The decision to ignite would be made in consultation with the Alberta Energy Regulator (AER). If the On-Site Supervisor determines that ignition is required, they are fully authorized to ignite the release at the pipeline, facility or terminal. Ignition of the gas source would ensure your safety if evacuation was not practical.

Investing in Rural Physicians

\$6 million earmarked to help pay for medical school if students agree to complete training in rural Alberta

Recently, media reports have covered staffing challenges in Fairview, Boyle, St. Paul, Elk Point, Rocky Mountain House, and Westlock.

Staffing challenges are not new to rural Albertans, who are familiar with the long standing challenge of recruiting doctors to their communities.

Unfortunately, COVID-19 has hit us hard. Doctors are not immune to the virus and have become sick themselves or have had to quarantine with loved ones. This has reduced the number of doctors who travel to fill shifts that would otherwise go unfilled.

Thankfully, vaccine supply has increased and the virus is receding along with the threat it poses to front line medical staff. This will lead to a more stable healthcare workforce in rural

Alberta in the coming weeks.

But that doesn't mean that we can rest easy. Recruiting new physicians is a major priority for our government and we are working hard to do just that.

Last year, funding for rural doctors has been increased by \$90 million. AHS has been directed to increase the hiring of Canadian and foreign trained doctors. And \$6 million in funding has been earmarked to help pay for medical school if students agree to complete their training in a rural community.

We are starting to see the benefits of this

investment. Over the last year, doctors have been recruited to Barrhead, Cold Lake, Whitecourt, Grande Prairie, Fort McMurray, St. Paul, Valleyview, McLennan and Falher.

More work is underway and more announcements of successful recruitments will be made over the coming months – and the work will not end there – Alberta's government is working with rural MLAs and AHS to further increase efforts to increase and improve access to healthcare services in rural Alberta.

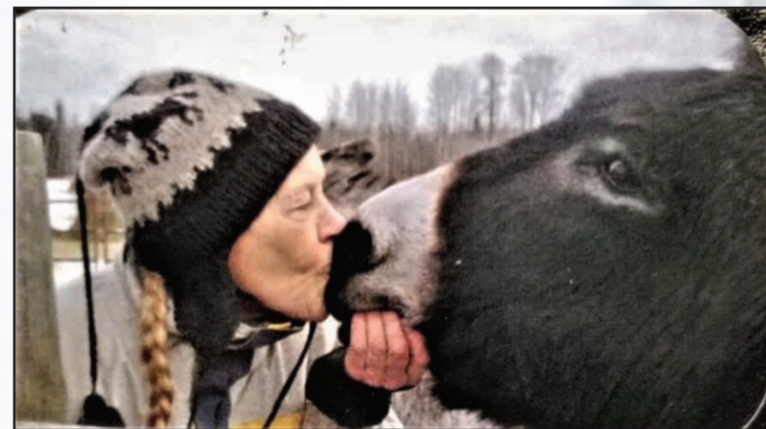

Residential Water Restriction Lifted

On June 29, as reservoir levels continued to drop with very little recovery, the Town of Edson implemented further measures to help maintain adequate water supply for fire emergencies and rebuild some of the supply. This included a Residential water ban, the Kinsmen Spray Park was closed, and the Edson Truck Fill Station was closed except for emergency situations.

As of July 5 the Town of Edson reservoir levels in Edson have returned to normal and the residential water ban was lifted for the community.

However, residents are asked to conserve by watering in the evening or early morning, avoid overwatering, as well as maintaining the standard odd/even watering system that was in place prior to the restrictions.

- Last number of the building address - 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 - please water on odd numbered days.
- Last number of the building address - 0, 2, 4, 6, 8 - please water on even numbered days.
- Hand watering landscaping and watering gardens with a hose is allowed any time.
- Kinsmen Spray Park is now open at normal operating hours. (10am to 8pm).
- Edson Truck Fill Station will open starting Tuesday morning.

As temperatures are expected to remain relatively high over the next week, please try to keep consumption low. For a list of ways you can help conserve water in our community, please visit www.edson.ca/green.

How to stay safe on the water this summer

provided by Alberta Health Services

As temperatures rise, Albertans will take to our province's lakes, rivers and pools to cool off and enjoy the outdoors. For many, swimming and water sports are an unmissable part of our short prairie summers. Yet these activities, which typically occur on unsupervised bodies of water, are not without risks.

More than 400 Canadians drown every year, making drowning one of the leading causes of death for people under the age of 25. In many cases, these deaths are preventable. According to the Canadian Red Cross, young men ages 15 to 44 and children ages 1 to 4 are at the greatest risk of drowning.

July 18 to 24 is National Drowning Prevention Week, a period dedicated to increasing awareness of the risks associated with drowning and offering steps everyone can take to enhance their water safety. Below are a few tips to remember before hitting the water:

- Always supervise children – Distractions, even momentary, can be

fatal. Drowning is fast and silent, often occurring in less than 30 seconds. Keep your eyes off your phone and on the water.

- Always wear a lifejacket when in a boat – Simply having a lifejacket on board is not adequate as its unlikely you'll be able to successfully retrieve it in

the event of an emergency. According to the Canadian Red Cross, only 12.5 per cent of people who drowned in boating-related accidents were wearing a properly-fastened and fitted life jacket.

- Use the buddy system - Avoid going on the water alone; instead, invite a friend so you can

look out for each other. Do this even if you're a strong swimmer.

- Know your limits – According to the Canadian Lifesaving Society, alcohol consumption is a factor in almost 40 per cent of boating-related fatalities. Both alcohol and cannabis use can impair your judgment, reflexes and balance.

GYPSED Transportation Services FAQ and Information Guide

What Transportation Services are Offered through GYPSED?

GYPSED strives to offer a range of services that are fair and equitable. Board Policy 17 is aligned with the province's *Education Act* and the *Student Transportation Regulation*. Services are available for:

- **Eligible:** Students who live more than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- **Ineligible:** Students who live less than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- **School of Choice:** Students who chose to attend a school other than their designated school
- **Transportation Out of District:** Students who chose to attend a different school jurisdiction
- **Alternate Second Seat:** Students who require a reserved second seat on a different bus to an alternate address

What Transportation Services are School Jurisdictions Funded to Provide?

Alberta Education Transportation Funding is for:

- Students residing more than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- Students with special needs who require specialized transportation

Under the School Transportation Regulation, school jurisdictions are not required to transport students beyond their designated school.

How Do I Determine my Child's Designated School?

Please visit the Division's website at www.gypsd.ca under **For Parents/Student Transportation** and enter your home address on the link *What is My Designated School?*

Why does Transportation Services Charge Fees for Some Services?

Fees are established to support transportation services for the jurisdiction's families who request them and to ensure classroom dollars are not being used to address transportation service funding gaps.

User fees are charged to parents of students who access transportation services as a way to recover the unfunded costs. GYPSED service fees are amongst the lowest in the province.

How is Eligibility for Transportation Determined?

- Alberta Education provides funding to eligible riders only.
- The distance of 2.4 kms for busing to the student's designated school is set by Alberta Education.
- The government sets eligibility based on the student's primary residence address and distance from home to designated school.

Do I Need to Register for the Bus?

NEW for the 2021/2022 School Year: All **new** and **returning** students requiring transportation services must register. Registration is now open.

How Do I Register for the Bus?

Registration for transportation services is at www.gypsd.ca under **For Parents/Student Transportation**. Only eligible riders are guaranteed a seat each year. All other riders are subject to seat availability.

Province seeks better deal for taxpayers on Sturgeon Refinery

AB gov't release

The Alberta government is getting a better deal for Alberta taxpayers on the Sturgeon Refinery, reducing risk and saving an estimated \$2 billion.

This timely and necessary step will optimize the refinery's value and give taxpayers greater control over its operations.

Under the new deal, the Government of Alberta becomes a 50 per cent equity partner in the refinery. Canadian Natural Resources Limited (Canadian

Natural) will continue to hold 50 per cent equity. There is no additional cost to taxpayers resulting from this process.

The estimated \$2 billion in long-term savings is due to an improvement in net present value (NPV) for taxpayers through the government. Simply put, it will be less of a financial commitment for the government over time. The restructured deal also reduces the previous operational risks under the original contracts by significantly streamlining the

ownership of the Sturgeon Refinery.

"We are taking action to get a better deal for taxpayers and reducing long-term costs. This agreement provides more economic certainty which will benefit Albertans today and into the future. We look forward to our renewed arrangement with the refinery's operator, the North West Redwater Partnership, in the years to come." -Sonya Savage, Minister of Energy

About the optimization

As part of the process, the government is transferred a 50 per cent ownership interest previously held by North West Refining.

This process will not cost taxpayers any additional funds than the government would otherwise be obligated to pay as a toll payer.

Through the agreement, the government is able to capture the value of processing bitumen as both a toll payer and facility owner.

This plan improves the government's net present value for the refinery by approximately \$2 billion over the life of the project. Net present value is the difference between present value of cash inflows and the present value of cash outflows over a period of time.

The plan also frees up \$1 billion in cash flow to the government over the next five years. The additional cash flow is a result of the restructuring.

The agreement includes a 10-year extension of the processing agreement to 2058.

The plan will provide a simplified governance structure for the refinery.

With this optimization, the government has an

equal vote in the control of the refinery to which it is the majority toll payer.

Canadian Natural will provide operational leadership to North West Redwater Partnership.

Canadian Natural will help maximize efficiency and production capacity for the benefit of the entire value chain. This includes looking at ways to improve uptime, enhance operating efficiency and costs.

Assuming an ownership position will enable greater government returns in the project's upside.

About the Sturgeon Refinery

Prior to this announcement, the Sturgeon Refinery was owned and operated by North West Redwater Partnership, which was owned in an equal 50-50 split by North West Refining Inc. and CNR (Redwater) Ltd., a subsidiary of Canadian Natural Resources Limited.

The Sturgeon Refinery is designed to process approximately 79,000 barrels per day of diluted bitumen from Alberta's oil sands into higher value products like low-carbon low-sulphur diesel, vacuum gas oil, diluent and natural gas

liquids.

The Sturgeon Refinery incorporates carbon capture into its design. The captured CO2 is exported to the Alberta Carbon Trunk Line and the end users sequester it – a source of revenue for the project. The CO2 captured is the equivalent

to emissions from 300,000 cars annually.

In April 2020, the Sturgeon Refinery successfully transitioned from primarily processing synthetic crude feedstock to bitumen feedstock and reached commercial operations on June 1, 2020.

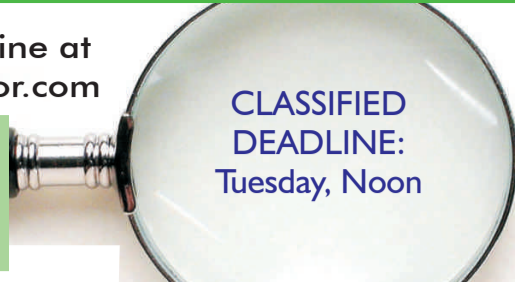
