

Wildfires reach the townsite of Jasper

In an emotional speech at 11:30am on July 25, Premier Danielle Smith thanked responders for their bravery and dedication. "Alberta stands ready to assist in any way we can." Initial estimates of the structural damage to the townsite are 30 to 50 percent.

Jasper Mayor Richard Ireland stated, "The news this evening [July 24] that the fire has entered our town has rocked us all. The pain and heartache that you feel is shared by each one of us."

Structural firefighters remained in town and are working to save as many structures as possible and protect critical infrastructure including the wastewater treatment plant, communications facilities, the Trans Mountain Pipeline, and others.

Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara stated, "Edson stands in solidarity with Jasper and will do whatever we can to help and support your community in the days, weeks and months ahead. We are all heartbroken by this loss."

An evacuation order was issued for Jasper National Park and the Town of Jasper which took place between 10pm on July 22 and 3am on July 23. Residents of Jasper and visitors to the national park were forced to evacuate after a wildfire spread into the area late Monday night.

Fires threatening from the northeast cut off highway access east to Edmonton. Another fire travelling up from the south forced the closure of the Icefields Parkway.

Evacuees were told to head west on Highway 16 towards British Columbia with little notice over dark mountain roads amidst soot and ash. Travelers heading to Jasper National Park were directed to travel back the way they came.

The Town of Valemount, with limited services, offered to accommodate evacuees at the community hall, but it quickly filled up. Prince George opened an evacuation center for evacuees at their CN

Emergency Info BC advised evacuees travelling from the Municipality of Jasper and Jasper National Park to continue on Highway 16 through B.C. (after resting) and select a route back to Alberta to designated reception centres opening in Grande Prairie and Calgary.

The fire is in Parks Canada's jurisdiction, however, Alberta Wildfire said it has been asked to help and on Monday night was currently responding with ground and air resources. Other agencies are supporting wildfire suppression efforts and evacuation support.

The federal government stated their priority is to protect the town and community of Jasper, limiting wildfire growth towards the town, Highway 16, and critical infrastructure. Jasper National Park and the Town of Jasper have mobilized all available resources, with federal, provincial, and municipal agencies all dedicated to supporting firefighting and protecting the town.

Structural protection crews and specialists installed structure protection sprinklers and hose lines throughout the community. Another highvolume system was being established at the southwest perimeter of the town.

The wildfire danger in the Edson Forest Area is extreme. This means that forest fuels are extremely dry and pose a very serious fire risk. Fast-spreading, high-intensity fires are likely, which may be very difficult to control.

The smoke settling over Yellowhead County, Hinton, and Edson is not produced by a wildfire in our forest area. Smoke columns from the wildfires in Jasper may be visible from some regions in Yellowhead County.

Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara stated on July 23, "As we know all too well, wildfire situations can escalate quickly and that's why we always have to be prepared. The Town of Edson has been in regular contact with our colleagues in Jasper since the start of the emergency and have offered whatever support we can. As the evacuation route was west instead of east, we have not had to open a reception centre, but we are fully prepared to if required."

"Moving Edson provided busses to support evacuation efforts last night. Other resources have been offered and will be deployed upon request. Our thoughts and prayers are with the people of Jasper as they deal with this difficult situation. This situation is a reminder to be prepared for an emergency at all times with a 72 hour emergency kit and plans in case a situation arises," Zahara added.

On July 23, Yellowhead County Mayor Wade Williams stated, "I just want to let the folks in the Jasper area know that our thoughts and prayers are with them as they are experiencing fire very close to Jasper and evacuations are in progress. I would just like to mention to the residents of Yellowhead County, we are in an extreme fire hazard situation. My advice is, it doesn't matter where you live in this county, have an evacuation plan ready, have your belongings packed up and ready to go so that you can escape within a few minutes."

In a public statement, NDP Emergency Preparedness and Climate Change Resilience critic, Richard Cannings, said, "New Democrats, local firefighters, and 75 per cent of Canadians have been urging the Liberals to create a National Wildfire Fighting Force so that Canada has the resources it needs to support people. We need to extinguish wildfires as quickly as possible, before they grow into monstrous blazes that destroy communities."

A fire ban is in effect as of July 10 in the entire Forest Protection Area of Alberta, including the Edson Forest Area, due to hot and dry conditions.

Splashes and fun at County's Bear Chase Triathlon

The sun was bright and the day was perfect for Yellowhead County's Bear Chase Triathlon on July 18. Families flocked to Bear Lake Park to watch and cheer on their young racers.

This year there were heats for kids ages 6 all the way to ages 13. The first of the races began at 5:30pm, signaling the start to an evening of fun.

The race course began in the lake and then a bike loop around the campground. It ends with a final sprint to the finish. The length of the races changed to fit the age group running. The longest race was 3.36kms —60m in the water, 2km on bike, and 1300m running. The shortest distance was 915 meters for the youngest kids —15min in the water, 600m biking, and 300m running.

The race did require preregistration and those who registered early received a t-shirt. This year over 90 kids signed up for the race. Racers were broken up into different heats organized by age. Some heats ended up being combined near the end of the day in order to avoid an oncoming thunderstorm.

All races were completed around 6:30 pm. Upon completion each racer received a medal to commemorate their achievement.

"The goal of the event is actually a few things," said Stefan Felsing, Communications Coordinator with Yellowhead County. "Its to bring the community together for a family friendly event, and it's a great event to get people outside and exercising. It also showcases one of our really nice Yellowhead County campgrounds."

There was a free BBQ for all in attendance. Trail Tire was running the BBQ and handing out burgers, chips, and lots of water. After the races were finished the County set up a jumpy castle for more fun. Kids and families could also enjoy the park amenities such as the lake and playground.

This is the eighth year that the Bear Chase Triathlon has run. Every year the county continues to improve the process and make it more fun for the kids and families involved. This year they moved the older racers a little further into the lake to give them a bit more of a challenge.

"It's turned into quite a tradition for some the families, and with new families coming in, it's quite fun," added Felsing. "It was definitely a successful event and we're looking forward to next





Town of Edson Council highlights for July 16

Emergency Management Advisory Committee. Council heard an annual update presented by the Director of Emergency Management.

Community Care Foundation of Edson and District. Members of the Community Care Foundation of Edson and District presented information regarding the newly formed Physician Attraction, Retention, and Recruitment sub-committee. The presentation included a request for a Council or Administration representation on the committee and a funding request of \$10,000 to support their initiative. Intermunicipal Development Plan Bylaw. Council passed the first reading of Bylaw 2306. Bylaw 2306 amends the Town of Edson and Yellowhead County Intermunicipal Development Plan Bylaw to reflect a revised Plan Area for the Bench Creek Area Structure Plan (ASP). The IDP provides a framework for the subdivision and development of single detached dwellings and is required by the Municipal Government Act (MGA). A Public Hearing has been set for Tuesday August 20, 2024, at 7:00pm, at the Edson Civic Centre.

Municipal Development Plan Bylaw. Council passed the first reading of Municipal Development Plan Bylaw 2307 which amends the Town of Edson's Municipal Development Plan Bylaw to reflect a revised Plan Area for the Bench Creek Area Structure Plan. A Public Hearing has been set for Tuesday August 20, 2024, at 7:00pm, at the Edson Civic Centre. Bench Creek Area Structure Plan Bylaw. Council passed the first reading of Bench Creek Area Structure Plan Bylaw 2309. An Area Structure Plan (ASP) provides direction for longterm land use and infrastructure planning of a defined area within a municipality. It is approved by a municipal council and is prepared in accordance with Section 633 of the MGA. A Public Hearing has been set for Tuesday August 20, 2024, at 7:00pm, at the Edson Civic Centre. **Intermunicipal Subdivision Development** Appeal Board Bylaw. The Town of Edson has been invited to join the Town of Hinton to establish an Intermunicipal Subdivision Development Appeal Board (ISDAB). Council passed all three (3) readings of the Intermunicipal Subdivision & Development Appeal Board Bylaw No. 2305 and Amending Fees and Charges Bylaw No. 2308. Council directed Administration to enter into the agreement with the Town of Hinton. To align with the Town of Hinton and ensure consistency across municipalities, Council approved adjusting the fee schedule for filing an appeal with the Town of Edson from \$200 to \$250. Meeting Procedures Bylaw. Council has passed all three (3) readings of Meeting Procedures Bylaw No. 2281. The re-write of the former Council Procedural Bylaw No. 2230 uses clear language and best practices to allow to accurate and precise meetings while streamlining processes.

Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR). Council directed Administration to proceed with the Opt-Out Service Model with Circular Materials for residential recyclables, allowing Circular to manage the contracts and services required under EPR. This process will allow for Circular Materials to negotiate an agreement with Edson and District Recycling Society to provide depot recycling services for designated materials. Strategic Plan Progress and 2024-2025 Priorities. Council approved the Strategic Plan Progress and 2024-2025 Priorities. Year-To-Date Budget vs Actual - Variance Analysis 2024. Council accepted the June 30, 2024, quarterly variance analysis and financial report as presented. Next meetings – The next Town Council Meeting is scheduled for August 20, 2024, at 7:00 pm, in Council Chambers.



We deserve a summer gas tax cut

Thousands of people are hoping to hit the open road this summer and head to Drumheller to see the dinosaurs or to the Western Development Museum to learn about the olden days.

There's just one problem: skyhigh taxes on gasoline and diesel.

Before we blame Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and his carbon tax that costs us 17 cents per litre of gasoline, folks in Alberta and Saskatchewan should cast a withering glance at their provincial capitals.

Yes, that's right. The governments of both Alberta and Saskatchewan are currently nailing drivers with the full cost of provincial fuel taxes.

In Alberta, drivers are paying the full 13 cents per litre for fuel. In Saskatchewan it's 15 cents per litre.

Premiers Danielle Smith and Scott Moe are right when they put the boots to Trudeau and tell him to scrap his carbon tax.

But both premiers have the power to provide immediate provincial tax relief at the gas pumps in their provinces.

So why aren't they?

In Alberta, Smith did the right

thing back in 2022 when she fully suspended the provincial fuel tax for a year. That saved drivers about \$10 every time they filled up their minivans and about \$15 for pickup trucks.

But as of Apr. 1 of this year, Alberta's fuel tax is back up to full freight at 13 cents per litre.

In Saskatchewan, Moe made a good move when he refused to collect Trudeau's carbon tax on home heating, but he hasn't reduced the fuel tax at all, not even once.

Now, compare the two fiercest premiers pushing for lower taxes from Ottawa, Smith and Moe, to the guy in the orange jersey in Winnipeg.

originally supposed to last six months, but he recently extended it another three months. That's going to help a lot of Manitoba families afford that summer road trip.

Even drivers in Ontario are getting a break at the gas pump. That's because Premier Doug Ford recently extended his own fuel tax cut.

Going further east, Liberal Newfoundland and Labrador Premier Andrew Furey recently extended his own eight cents per litre gas tax cut for the entire year.

And Smith and Moe can afford to offer relief to drivers without impacting their budgets and with only an ounce of spending restraint. In Alberta, the fuel tax only brings in about 1.9 percent of the province's revenue. In Saskatchewan, it's about 2.6 percent.

The governments of both provinces need to trim some fat. In Alberta, Smith could start by halting the \$330 million she's earmarked to help the billionaire owners of the Calgary Flames build a new rink. Or it could wind down the Alberta Enterprise Corporation, a corporate welfare machine sitting on about \$330 million worth of assets.

In Saskatchewan, Moe could pull back on the up to \$3.7 million handout the government is offering WestJet. The government of Saskatchewan also needs to reduce its spending wholesale. This year, it is spending more money per person than any other province in Western Canada, including the NDP governments of British Columbia and Manitoba.

Both premiers know that people need help affording the necessities, especially with the burden of the federal carbon tax.



Drought Livestock Assistance program does not fairly reflect what rural producers experienced

"In 2023, the impacts of drought within Alberta were far reaching and in response to the situation, Canada and Alberta partnered on a one-time funding initiative called the Canada-Alberta Drought Livestock Assistance initiative," said Jennifer Benson, Agricultural Services Supervisor, during the Yellowhead County council meeting on July 23.

On October 20, 2023, the province announced the inclusion of 41 rural municipalities in the program, leaving a further 28-member rural municipalities out of the program.

On January 25, a further 20 rural municipalities were announced as additions to the funding. Oddly, Kananaskis, Calgary, and Edmonton were included in the January 25 announcement.

This left eight rural municipalities, including Yellowhead County, out of the funding program.

"Letters were sent to the federal and provincial governments asking for explanation and the response provided was that these municipalities had received average to above average precipitation over the course of the 2023 growing season," said Benson. white and green zones. If entire areas are being aggregated in the Canadian Drought Monitor assessments, it is not a fair reflection of what is being experienced by producers in white zones that are adjacent to

green zones," said Benson. Moisture that falls within forested crown lands does not address moisture deficits experienced in privately held agricultural lands.

The draft resolution was created jointly by the eight municipalities that were left out of the second inclusion. It's main statement reads: "That Alberta Agricultural Service boards advocate to the Federal government to re-evaluate the current weather mapping program and the Drought Monitoring System to include and more heavily weigh data from weather stations within agricultural lands, better acknowledging municipalities straddling the transition from agricultural white zone into forested Crown green zone, coupled with making efforts to capture in these maps the extreme weather events that are now a reality."

The finalized resolution will be brought forward to the fall Agricultural Service Board (ASB) North West Regional Conference which will be held on October 30, 2024 in Parkland County. time in the store to help sell the clothes. They also have shoes and bedding. Hours of operation for shopping are every Wednesday and Thursday from 12:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. they are located at 5112 - 3rd Avenue in Edson and their phone number is 780-723-4545.

A review of the Canadian Drought Monitor revealed that the eight municipalities are comprised of large areas of forested crown lands with relatively small zones of privately held agricultural lands.

Further analysis suggested that while these agricultural areas experienced significant drought impacts, when balanced against moisture in the crown lands, the municipalities only appeared to receive adequate moisture.







Canola prices floundering

There are several factors affecting canola prices and constraining a significant price rally

"Canola prices eroded from last August to a February low," explains Neil Blue, provincial crops market analyst with the Alberta government. "Following a seasonal pattern, canola prices rose during the spring, gaining over \$100/tonne from those February lows."

However, during June, canola prices again moved lower and have traded around in a lower range, coming close to but remaining above the February lows near \$600/tonne for the November futures contract. These price levels are historically strong, although much below the record-high prices of June 2022.

There are several factors affecting canola prices and constraining a significant price rally. Despite the dryness in much of western Canada last summer, 2023 canola yields were close to average and much above the drought-reduced yields of 2021.

Canadian Grain Commission data shows that 11 months into the 2023-24 crop year, producer deliveries of canola were 16.6 million tonnes, just below the year ago level. Domestic use of 10.25 million tonnes, mainly canola crushing, is 900,000 tonnes above year ago at the end of June and is on pace to set a crop year record.

Conversely, Canadian canola exports to June 30 are 1.35 million tonnes below last year's pace. The lower total Canadian canola use will lead to a further increase in canola carryover, although still not as high as in 2018 and 2019. Canadian canola basis levels indicate complacency among buyers," says Blue. Another factor affecting markets is the speculative fund position, which is reporrecord short in U.S. soybean futures.

Canola prices are closely related to world vegetable oil prices. For example, U.S. soybean oil prices have had a similar price movement as canola during the last year as shown in the chart below.

Regarding 2024 crop prospects, canola crops in the Canadian Prairies and the U.S. are in overall good condition to mid-July. The U.S. soybean crop is rated as 68% good to excellent condition, higher than last year's 57% rating in mid-July. South American soybean production, despite being reduced in Brazil due to dryness, was high overall and is currently being marketed to the world.

"Subject to a major crop threatening weather development, market action indicates expectations

of average or higher production of northern hemisphere oilseed crops. Mediocre western Canadian canola basis levels indicate complacency among buyers," says Blue.

Another factor affecting markets is the speculative fund position, which is reported to be record short in U.S. soybean futures. Development of a weather threat could lead to funds buying back some of those short positions and that could cause the canola price to rally. That happened in early July and, although the price rally was temporary, it did provide a brief pricing opportunity.

"Following crop markets is a year-round activity, even when there are no crops in the bin," says Blue. "Although prices have moderated from those of 2022, it is potentially profitable strategy to have target prices in mind and keep at least in casual contact with the markets to be able to take advantage of pricing opportunities when they arise." -AgriNews


