

got to try some roasted beaver tail. We had lots of open range for fun."

In the afternoon the event was open for the whole community to join in, with more homemade bannock and jam, various demonstrations including moose nose cooking, dried meat, and beaver tail. Every part of the animal was eaten or preserved, including the nose. The moose's long nose is still considered a delicacy among Indigenous communities.

There were also opportunities to make a drum, and to do some fish scaling and fish scale art.

Kristie Gomuwka, with the Friendship Centre, said, "We decided to do an event within the community, something that is available to everybody. We brought in some food and some Indigenous games for kids to play. It was a great opportunity to gather, as no one has been able to the past couple of years."

"There have been tons of people here checking out the event, which is great to see," said

When asked why this event was important to the community, Gomuwka replied, "With many of our conversations with the Elders and the board, it's important that reconciliation happens where we open ourselves up to the larger community. This allows people the opportunity to experience these

traditions, and we can celebrate together. Years gone by things were only done in classrooms at school or alone. We feel this is a better opportunity for people to just get to know each other and build our community."


This was also the 13th year that Eddie's Big Run has taken place. After a short break, the committee will begin planning for next year's event. The unofficial date is June 17, 2023.



June 18 was a beautiful day in Edson as many local kids set up stands to participate in Lemonade Day. From the east, to west, the town was full of young entrepreneurs taking advantage of this opportunity. In total there were 18 stands scattered throughout Edson, most of which were operating from 10am until 3-4 pm.

Lemonade Day is a provincial event put on by Community Futures. The goal of the day is to inspire the entrepreneurs of tomorrow, by equipping them with training and experience. All participants have the opportunity to learn from mentors, and are encouraged to partner with local businesses when putting together their stands.

"The kids create their own stand and create their own product," said Community Futures General Manager Nancy Robbins. "They go though a little bit of health and safety training, they get a business license, and they also complete business training." Robbins also stated that this was the biggest year yet for the event.

When asked why she decided to take part, Clara VanderKooi, operator of the Sweet as Hunny Stand, said, "Last year I knew about it too late, and I thought it was a really interesting and fun idea." VanderKooi also said that the most important thing she learned about running a business during the process was the value of "keeping organized."

While the kids do get to keep a percentage of the money they make, each stand was encouraged to also choose to donate some to a charity of their choice. Rayne Frykas, owner of the Magic Dragon Lemonade stand said she took part, "Because I wanted to raise money for the Food Bank."

The kids also compete for the chance to win in three different categories: Area Best Entrepreneur, Area Best Tasting Lemonade, and Area Best Lemonade Stand. In the Edson area the winner in all three categories was 'Kaylee's Little Lemon Makes' located in front of Scobey's grocery.

While the depot does accept most hazardous materials on a regular day, Toxic Round Up is a great way to encourage proper disposal. "It's a great weekend to encourage everyone to come out and drop off all their hazardous and toxic waste, and enjoy a free lunch," said Jonah Kuzmic with the Toxic

Round Up. Materials considered hazardous are anything that is corrosive, flammable, reactive, or toxic. This includes things like paint, florescent light bulbs, tires, and old electronics. But also lesser known household hazardous waste items such as fabric softener, and nail polish.

Like most events the Round Up was put on hold during the COVID restrictions. This year's event

Bottle Drive for Shandy's Dream for a Cure

On June 18, Barbie Reichenbacher, along with other volunteers held a bottle drive at the Galloway Station Museum to raise funds for Shandy's Dream for a Cure.

Reichenbacher, Shandy's mom, said, "Shandy battled cancer for 18 months during which she went into remission for three short months. When her cancer returned, there was no viable treatment options. Shandy asked me to help find a cure 'so no kid has to go through what I did'. We started Shandy's Dream for a Cure in 2016 with proceeds going to the Brain Tumour Foundation to help fund Pediatric Brain Cancer Research."

She continued, "We typically host a BBQ fundraiser which includes a memorial walk around Centennial Park and a butterfly release. The last two years, however, due to Covid, we were unable to host our BBQ fundraiser, so we decided to do a bottle drive. The bottle drive was so successful that we decided to do both fundraisers this year."

The BBQ fundraiser and butterfly release will be held on June 25, 2022, at Centennial Park, 12pm- 4 pm.

In 2019 The Brain Tumour Foundation awarded Shandy's Dream for a Cure a community service award. At that time over \$100,000 had been raised. Reichenbacher estimates another \$20,000 has been raised since that time.

Reichenbacher concluded, "I should add that Shandy's Dream would never have been as successful as it is if it wasn't for all the community support we have received over the years."

County Council ponders new Municipal Planning Commission

During the County's Governance and Priorities Committee Meeting on June 21, the concept of a Municipal Planning Commission was discussed.

Cory Armfelt, Manager of Planning and Development Services stated that, "Since the new bylaw came into effect though, at times when Development Officers are making decisions on impacts to adjacent properties for innovative or contentious proposed uses, Administration feels there would be an advantage to have an external committee evaluating permits. In these instances, Administration would be treated as an information gathering and recommendation making resource, not as the decision making authority."

Armfelt stated that an option enshrined in the Municipal Government Act is the ability for a

municipality to create a Municipal Planning Commission (MPC).

Through the creation of a MPC, Administration would have the option of directing 'contentious' or non-typical development permits and matters to the Commission. It was proposed the commission could consist of three members at large and two councillors.

"Having the option of engaging a MPC in planning and development matters would benefit the municipality by allowing additional transparency," stated Armfelt.

County Mayor Wade Williams said, "I do have some concerns with this, but I think I would wait for this draft bylaw to come back before council to see what is covered in there and what is not, and I would bring my concerns up at that point."

Councillor Shawn Berry said, "This is a great

way to move forward with a large item that needs to be discussed more publicly before the development permit is issued."

Councillor Dawn Mitchell said, "I think this would work if you continue to have a strong council that does not succumb to public pressure."

Councillor Anthony Giezen said, "I like the proposal and would like to see it in draft format."

Councillor David Russell advocated that the council itself should stand as the MCP. "If there is a conflict why can't it come before their elected representatives —us? He added, "We can listen to their concerns and come to a decision."

The motion was passed to direct Administration to prepare and bring back to a future Governance and Priorities Committee Meeting a draft Municipal Planning Commission Bylaw or alternative for consideration.

Revision to Vision Park Phase One

Increases in construction costs, building materials and administration costs resulted in a higher than anticipated bid for the Phase One Vision Park Revitalization project.

Administration and EDS Consulting reviewed the project parameters to create a plan for Council's consideration that they believe would be the best path forward.

Administration proposed the project continue with the rebuilding of three diamonds in the NW corner, landscaping to improve drainage, the construction of two 300 foot diamonds, and providing dugouts similar to the current style.

include the development of a new parking lot near the rebuilt diamonds.

Items such as bleachers, picnic tables, and batting cages which were part of the original Phase One plan have been remove from the revised plan. However, administration noted that those items could be revisited at a later date should funds become available.

Councillor Pasychny expressed concerns with the proposed parking lot including drainage concerns as well as safety

Also proposed was to concerns for pedestrians and spectators. "It is not a good location...," said Pasychny who noted he has more than 10 years of experience with tournaments at Vision Park, "It is a horrible spot for a parking lot."

> Mayor Zahara said he would prefer to see the money for the parking lot, which he agreed raised some concerns, be spent on batting cages. Council voted to adopt the revised plan and not proceed with the parking lot as proposed.

Reduced speed limit in County residential subdivisions proposed

The County has received a request from residents in Miller Lake Subdivision asking the County to reduce the speed limit on the roadways within the subdivision to 50 km/hr. The speed limit is currently

The maximum speed for vehicles in a designated hamlet is 50 km/hr.

During the County's Governance and Priorities Committee Meeting on June 21, Councillor Dawn Mitchell said, "Speed limits across Alberta, and Canada as a whole, are being reduced for safety reasons." Mitchell pointed out the County's residential subdivisions do not have sidewalks which emphasized the need for a reduced speed limit. "Residents need to walk on the sides of the road. You have people ripping past at 60 km/hr —that's not okay." She pointed out that neighbouring municipalities have residential speed limits set at 50 km/hr or even 40 km/hr.

Mitchell then proposed that speed limits in all the county's residential subdivisions be lowered to 50

Council debated the merits of reducing speed limits in subdivisions where residences are spaced out with long driveways. County CAO Luc Mercier point out that, "With respect to council, we need to be consistent with speed limits all our residential subdivisions. I do not believe we can pick and choose. It does put us in a libellous position if we have 50 km/hr in Miller's Lake and 60 km/hr in Seabolt..." —if an accident occurs in Seabolt.

Council voted to bring back an amendment to the bylaw to reduce speed limits in its residential subdivisions to 50 km/hr.
