Province speeding up second-doses

Alberta's vaccine rollout continues to reach new milestones, with more than 2.8 million doses administered to date and 63.4 per cent of Albertans aged 12-plus having received at least one dose, the province stated in a release on June 1, 2021.

Albertans will be able to schedule second-dose appointments in the order they received their first doses.

- Anyone vaccinated in March or earlier can book their second dose starting June 1.

- Anyone vaccinated in April can book their second dose starting June 14.

- Anyone vaccinated in May can book their second dose starting June 28.

A single dose of COVID-19 vaccine offers at least 80 per cent protection against severe outcomes, including hospitalization and death.

However, second doses are needed to get the best and most long-lasting protection against the virus.

Alberta is a national leader in second doses, with 10.4 per cent of eligible Albertans already fully protected with

two doses.

"Every Albertan who has received their first dose of COVID-19 vaccine will be able to book their second dose by the end of the month. This will provide Albertans with even more protection as we get ready to be open for summer and get back to normal. Please do your part by booking your second doses so we can beat COVID-19, once and for all," stated Premier Jason Kenney.

"First doses have brought Albertans much-needed relief to our families, our communities and our health system, but two doses are necessary for full protection. We are staggering the seconddose rollout to start with those who received their first dose earliest. Thank you to the AHS workers, pharmacists and physicians who continue to work tirelessly to administer these vaccines and to all Albertans who have chosen to get protected," stated Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health.

"I strongly urge all Albertans to book their second-dose appointments in the coming weeks and months. It is critical that everyone who has received their first dose shows up for their second. In the meantime, we all need to continue to follow public health measures to keep driving transmission down," stated Dr. Deena Hinshaw, chief medical officer of health.

Booking a seconddose appointment:

Where possible, AHS

and participating until eight weeks have pharmacies that administered the first dose will contact Albertans to remind them they are eligible for their second dose.

However, Albertans do not need to wait to be contacted to book an appointment once they become eligible. Albertans can choose to book a second dose wherever they wish to be immunized.

Appointments for second doses can be made online through the AHS website, by calling 811 or through participating pharmacies and physicians' offices. Second doses will be available on a first-come, first-served basis.

While the interval between first and second doses will start at 12 weeks, Alberta will now be able to offer second-dose appointments at progressively earlier intervals, provided vaccine supply remains stable.

- For Pfizer and Moderna, the interval will be lowered over time to a minimum of three to four weeks as supply becomes available and we work through the eligible groups.
- For AstraZeneca, the interval will be lowered over time to a minimum recommended length of eight weeks or more for best effectiveness.

AstraZeneca:

Albertans who received an AstraZeneca dose in March or earlier can now book second-dose appointments. Anyone who received it in April or May should wait passed since their first dose before booking.

Albertans who received a first dose of AstraZeneca will have a choice:

- book a second appointment for AstraZeneca by going to the online AHS booking site, calling 811, or going to a pharmacy listed on the Alberta Blue Cross website
- book a second appointment for an mRNA vaccine through participating pharmacies or AHS

First doses

Bookings for first doses remain the top priority. Albertans who have not yet received their first dose of vaccine protection are encouraged to book an appointment as soon as possible.

Alberta's government is responding to the COVID-19 pandemic by protecting lives and livelihoods with precise measures to bend the curve, sustain small businesses and protect Alberta's health-care system.

Province-Wide Survey Identifies Rural Housing Challenges

(YC) In the fall of 2020, Yellowhead County took part in a large-scale, collaborative effort to measure homelessness throughout the eastern rural areas of the county. Within the county, 22 respondents (61% of total respondents) were found to have housing conditions that are considered to be insecure and/or absent.

According to this survey, a lack of money, unaffordable rent or mortgage, mental health struggles, and medical conditions are the primary pressing concerns for eastern Yellowhead County residents with insecure housing.

"It can be really difficult to know how to help people, if you don't understand the scope or characteristics of a problem," says Wendy Robinson, Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) Supervisor. "Thankfully, we were able to complete the survey prior to many

businesses and services shutting down in the fall. This is important, because housing insecurity has the potential to become an even greater issue going forward."

The project, known as the Rural Housing and Service Needs Estimation, saw over 24 communities across Alberta survey a total of 1,800 respondents and was overseen by the Rural Development Network and funded in part by Reaching Home, the Government of Canada's official homelessness strategy.

Over a 30 day-period, service agencies invited residents to fill out a survey that asked questions about their housing situations, their employment, and the kinds of services they currently need and receive. Since homelessness also includes living conditions that aren't permanent and reliable, this method was used to identify individuals living in all four kinds of homelessness as defined by the

Canadian Observatory on Homelessness.

Responses will be used to develop strategies to fill identified gaps in service. This is the first step towards ensuring no one gets left behind in Yellowhead County. Participation in future projects will help improve services by measuring their effectiveness.

Yellowhead County FCSS would like to thank our partner agencies, including WEE Food Bank, Yellowhead County Libraries, and the Yellowhead Emergency Shelter. Most importantly, we'd like to thank the people that took the time to share their experiences. Their stories provide a guide map for how they can be better supported, and preventive strategies implemented.





Stage 2 could begin as early as June 10

If we all don't apparently behave like our Premier, that is...

With over 60 per cent of eligible Albertans vaccinated, Stage 2 easing could begin on June 10, subject to hospitalizations being below 500 and trending downwards.

The two-week waiting period begins once the 60 per cent trigger has been met to provide time for the vaccine to take effect.

The province has reached another milestone, with the number of people hospitalized due to COVID-19 dropping to only 478. If this trend continues, Stage 2 easing of restrictions could start on June 10.

"This decline in the number of people in hospital due to COVID-19 shows that Albertans' efforts to stick to guidelines and to get vaccinated are paying off. As long as hospitalizations stay below 500, we will move into Stage 2 on June 10 and be one step closer to having an amazing and fully open Alberta summer," stated Premier Jason Kenney.

With the vaccination program protecting more and more Albertans, and fewer people in hospital due to COVID-19, it certainly seems we are finally on the right track to a safe reopening.

"The next two weeks will be a critical time for Alberta. The more we can drive our numbers down in the next few weeks by all following public health measures, and the more Albertans who are protected by immunization, the more successful we will be in our opening," stated Dr. Deena Hinshaw, chief medical officer of health.

Unfortunately, Premier Kenney seemed to immediately ignore Dr. Hinshaw's good advice. The Premier, Health Minister Tyler Shandro, and an assortment of cabinet ministers were photographed dining on the cozy balcony of the 'Sky Palace' in Edmonton, on June 1 — apparently in clear violation of the government's own Covid-19 social gathering restrictions.

In the photographs posted on news networks and social media, nobody is seen wearing masks and the majority of people, including Premier Kenney, were not physical distancing. Plates and bottles of alcohol can been seen on the large shared table.

Current restrictions clearly state for dining on patios, parties should be limited to four per table, all from the same household.

The attitude of 'do what I say, not as I do' is the height of hubris and hypocrisy and sours what should be a shared, joyful sigh of relief that we are finally coming to the (cautious)



end of this dreadful pandemic.

But getting back to the good news, is that 60 additional

physician clinics throughout the province will join the vaccine rollout in the coming weeks, following the 20 clinics across the province that participated in a successful pilot.

Restrictions eased in Stage 2 of the Open for Summer Plan

- Outdoor social gatherings increase to 20 people, with distancing.
- Wedding ceremonies may occur with up to 20 attendees. Receptions are permitted outdoors only.
- Restaurants may seat tables with up to six people, indoors or outdoors.
- Dining parties are no longer restricted to households only.
- Physical distancing and other restrictions still apply.
- Retail capacity increases to onethird of fire code occupancy (must maintain ability to distance).
- Capacity for places of worship increases to one-third of fire code occupancy.
- Gyms and other indoor fitness open for solo and drop-in activities with three-metre distancing between participants and fitness classes may resume with three-metre distancing.
- Indoor settings may open with up to one-third of fire code occupancy, including indoor recreation centres. This includes arenas, cinemas, theatres, museums, art galleries and libraries.
- Indoor and outdoor youth and adult sports resume with no restrictions.
- Youth activities, such as day camps and play centres, may resume, with restrictions.
- Personal and wellness services can resume walk-in services.
- Post-secondary institutions can resume in-person learning.
- The work-from-home order is lifted but still recommended.
- Outdoor fixed seating facilities (e.g., grandstands) can open with one-third seated capacity.
- Public outdoor gatherings increase to 150 people (e.g. concerts/festivals), with restrictions.
- Distancing and masking requirements remain in effect.

Indoor masking and distancing requirements will remain in place throughout this stepped approach and some degree of restrictions will still apply to all activities within each step.

Self-employed workers who repaid the CERB to be reimbursed

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise that starting on

May 27, 2021, self-employed workers who meet the remission order criteria and who had voluntarily repaid all or part of the CERB to the CRA or Service Canada can request a reimbursement of their payments only from the CRA. These workers can do so by completing the CRA form at: T180 CERB reimbursement application for self-employed individuals - Canada.ca and submitting it to the CRA electronically or by mail.

The CRA will begin processing applications after June 15, 2021. Eligible Canadians who repaid the CERB can expect reimbursements within approximately 90 days of



submitting their applications to the CRA. Self-employed workers whose

net self-

employment income was less than \$5,000 and who applied for the CERB will not be required to repay the CERB, as long as:

- They have filed their 2019- and 2020-income tax returns by December
- · Their gross self-employment income was \$5,000 or more in 2019 or in the 12 months prior to their initial application; and
- · They met all other CERB eligibility criteria.

The CRA will review the 2019- and 2020-income tax returns of workers in this situation to verify that these conditions are met.

GYPSD Transportation Services FAQ and Information Guide

What Transportation Services are Offered through GYPSD?

GYPSD strives to offer a range of services that are fair and equitable. Board Policy 17 is aligned with the province's *Education Act* and the *Student Transportation Regulation*. Services are available for:

- Eligible: Students who live more than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- Ineligible: Students who live less than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- · School of Choice: Students who chose to attend a school other than their designated school
- Transportation Out of District: Students who chose to attend a different school jurisdiction
- Alternate Second Seat: Students who require a reserved second seat on a different bus to an alternate address

What Transportation Services are School Jurisdictions Funded to Provide?

Alberta Education Transportation Funding is for:

- · Students residing more than 2.4 km away from their designated school
- · Students with special needs who require specialized transportation

Under the School Transportation Regulation, school jurisdictions are not required to transport students beyond their designated school.

How Do I Determine my Child's Designated School?

Please visit the Division's website at www.gypsd.ca under **For Parents/Student Transportation** and enter your home address on the link *What is My Designated School?*

Why does Transportation Services Charge Fees for Some Services?

Fees are established to support transportation services for the jurisdiction's families who request them and to ensure classroom dollars are not being used to address transportation service funding gaps.

User fees are charged to parents of students who access transportation services as a way to recover the unfunded costs. GYPSD service fees are amongst the lowest in the province.

How is Eligibility for Transportation Determined?

- Alberta Education provides funding to eligible riders only.
- The distance of 2.4 kms for busing to the student's designated school is set by Alberta Education.
- The government sets eligibility based on the student's primary residence address and distance from home to designated school.

Do I Need to Register for the Bus?

NEW for the 2021/2022 School Year: All **new** and **returning** students requiring transportation services must register. Registration is now open.

How Do I Register for the Bus?

Registration for transportation services is at www.gypsd.ca under **For Parents/Student Transportation**. Only eligible riders are guaranteed a seat each year. All other riders are subject to seat availability.





Holy Redeemer Graduation was One for the Ages

(HRH) It goes without saying that this past school year has been one that has been deeply challenging on so many levels. There were many new rules and protocols, along with transitions between in-person learning and online

"As I'm sure many of us students can say we never could have even begun guessing how our years at HRH would progress," says Knight during her Valedictorian Address. "And although it has been a pretty crazy road for many, if not all of us, our time in high school was an amazing and important stepping stone in our lives." Knight also remarked on the many memories she has with friends and teachers, and how she and so many others have grown so much into who they are today because of their time at HRH.

The next virtual display was made by HRH Technology Facilitator Cheryl Fogarty who developed the Liturgy led by Father Thomas and liturgical readings from

many of the Grads. Within the video, there was a special moment to recognize Shandy Reichenbacher, a fellow student who tragically passed away of cancer while this class was in grade 6 at Vanier in 2015. 




Rick was a Navy veteran, a third class power engineer, a pilot, an adrenaline junkie, meticulous and detailed in all he did. He led a full life.
