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# **Exploring the stories behind local landmark names**

attendees enjoyed the free snacks and bought a glass of wine.

The main presentation was given by Madison Sharman, Heritage Coordinator for Yellowhead County. After a short break the museum staff offered a brief presentation focusing specifically on the Edson area.

"Place names are more than labels on a map," said Sharman, "They are windows into the past, reflections of our culture, and makers of our identity." The presentation covered locations all

across the county from as far north as Pinto Creek to west beyond Hinton. Sharman went into detail on the many lakes, creeks, mountains, landmarks, and history that comprise our county.

Some locations, such as Barbara Creek and the community of Bickerdike were named after the people who lived and worked within the county. Others, such as Alpha Lake, were sequentially named by early surveyors. As an example, January Creek, which runs past Peers, was named, supposedly, because the Dominion Land Surveyors arrived there in January. "The goal of these events are to inspire people to look into their local history. There are so many place names that we don't even think about," said Sharman.

The Galloway's presentation then focused on the town of Edson. This included the origin of the name 'Edson' as well as some of the neighbourhoods within. The area of Tiffin, for example, was named after Dr. Tiffin, a respected physician from Edson's early years. "This is one of our speakers series," said Museum Manager, Sherri McDowel. "We try to do this a couple of times a year; have a free event to get people out to learn about local history."

At the end of the night attendees were welcome to add local names and landmarks to one of the county maps on display. "It is also an opportunity for the County Heritage Program to get out there and record place names. We got a whole bunch more tonight, which is awesome," added Sharman.

Sharman also provided handouts and other external research for those who were interested. The event proved to be popular with approximately 30 people in attendance. There are four more events planned for locations throughout the county including:

- March 15 at 10am at the Northern Rockies Museum in Hinton.
- March 20 at 7pm at Wildwood Public Library.
- March 29 at 2pm at Tipple Park Museum in Evansburg.
- April 3 at 7pm at Marlboro Hall.

There are also be events planned for Cadomin and Brule in the future.

# County to develop new residential lots in Evansburg

At their February 25 meeting, Yellowhead County Council heard from Cory Armfelt, General Manager of Infrastructure and Planning Services, regarding the potential to develop new residential lots in the hamlet of Evansburg.

The County recently sold the remaining residential lots within the cul-de-sacs along 46A Street in Evansburg, but their Planning Department regularly receives inquiries from prospective residential landowners wanting to build homes in the community.

There are four County-owned lots at the west end of 45 Avenue next to the Elementary School. The parcels were inherited from the original Village of Evansburg.

Water and sanitary lines along 45 Avenue are due to be upgraded, presenting the opportunity to extend service to these lots, accommodating the current market demand while the local improvement upgrades are underway.

"As part of local improvement upgrades, bringing new lots online now will result in cost efficiencies," read Appendix A from the Request for Decision.

The process does come with some "anticipated challenges" such as removing the Municipal Reserve (MR) designation from some of the existing lots and the potential need for a road closure of a portion of the road and/or undeveloped laneway to maximize the layout of the new lots.

The design and configuration of the lots would be done by subdivision and would bring the potential for approximately eight new large residential lots in Evansburg. "Larger residential lots are the notable preference for new residential development inquiries in Evansburg," reads the RFD.

Armfelt recommended that Council direct Administration to proceed with the development of new residential lots at the end of 45 Avenue in Evansburg while the upgrades for the local improvements are occurring. This would allow the process for the creation of new residential lots to begin.

Councillor Brigitte Lemieux agreed with the logic of servicing the lots at the same time as the other areas in need of upgrades, but asked for clarification on what Council would be directing.

"If we say yes to this today, are we saying yes to servicing or are we saying yes to the development of these lots?" Lemieux asked. "Because if we are saying yes to the development, then I would need to know what the cost will be to develop this area."

GM Armfelt explained that in proceeding with the development of new lots, there would be "a number of points where we would be re-engaging with Council related to the entire matter of what's happening within that vicinity in Evansburg."

Armfelt added that cost estimates would be brought back to Council with the local improvement analysis that will occur at an upcoming meeting. "We'll know what that local improvement cost is and we'll know what it will cost to bring these lots online, and then Council can have that as a checkpoint of whether to continue or not," he said.

County CAO Luc Mercier specified that the intent of the recommended motion was to "get Council direction to proceed with looking at the options to develop this piece of the subdivision."

"We have no authority to expend any funds on this whatsoever until Council gives that approval," Mercier explained. "The cost approvals will all be forwarded to Council in the coming weeks as we go through this process."

Councillor Patrick Soroka of Division 1 (Evansburg and Area) agreed that Council would need to know more about costs, but noted that he has also received inquiries for residential lots.

"I have been approached by a lot of people and got a lot of phone calls looking for places to live in Evansburg, and there is limited area," Soroka said. "There's been a lot of inquiry, so we'll have to see what the cost is first... but I don't think we'll have a problem selling the lots at all."

Councillor David Russell wanted to ensure that

residents would still have opportunities in the process to voice their opinions.

"Very much," said Armfelt, explaining that between public hearing components for required bylaws and cost implications related to the local improvement that would be shared with landowners, there would be "many avenues for making sure that residents are satisfied going forward."

Council voted unanimously to proceed with the development of new residential lots in Evansburg.





The public is considered officially notified of approved development permits once posted online, in accordance with the Public Notification Bylaw. The Yellowhead County Land Use Bylaw NO 02.24 provides that any person claiming to be affected by a decision of the Development Authority may appeal to the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board or Alberta's Land and Property Rights Tribunal dependent on jurisdiction of the appeal authority. Appeals under the jurisdiction of Yellowhead County's Subdivision and Development Appeal Board require a written notice of appeal and a payment of \$500.00 payable to Yellowhead County within 21 day of the publishing of the Notice of Decision.

## **Edson Forest Area Wildfire Update**

The risk of a wildfire is present year-round depending on weather conditions and snow levels. If you are doing any burning, monitor the weather forecast and manage smoke impacts on nearby communities and transportation corridors, and check your winter burns regularly to ensure they're fully extinguished.

Wildfire season starts March 1. This means that all burning, with the exception of a campfire, will require a burn permit. Ensure your piles are completely extinguished before March 1 or contact us ahead of the date to apply for a permit.

If you see smoke or flame in the forest and suspect it's a wildfire, call 310-FIRE.

#### EDSON FOREST AREA WILDFIRE UPDATE

The wildfire danger in the Edson Forest Area remains LOW. Since January 1, 2025, there have been two wildfires in the Edson Forest Area burning a total of 0.32 ha.

EWF001 was detected on Jan 1 and burnt approximately 0.07 ha. EWF002 was reported on Feb 9 and burnt approximately 0.25 ha. We would like to remind the land owners and

industry partners that winter wildfires are possible, regardless of snow conditions. Keep a close watch on weather, never burn more than you can manage, and return to your site often to ensure your piles are out completely.



#### Alberta stands to lose most in trade war

Ottawa must resist calls for reckless trade retaliation that would cripple key industries and deepen regional divisions

Calls for Canada to respond aggressively to U.S. trade threats ignore the economic realities of such a move. Consider Quebec and Alberta energy. The stakes for Alberta and Quebec in this morbidly anticipated trade-war gamble are profoundly asymmetric, with Alberta standing to lose far more in absolute terms and per capita. The arguments to engage in such conflict are reckless and fail to recognize the magnitude of our economic integration with the United States.

Canada and the U.S. share one of the world's most extensive and intertwined trading relationships. In 2022, bilateral trade in goods and services exceeded \$900 billion annually. Canada exported 75 per cent of its goods to the U.S. Beyond trade, bilateral investment is immense, with more than \$1 trillion in two-way direct investment.

A trade war would jeopardize trade and these capital flows, which are critical for businesses and public finances. Retaliatory tariffs or export restrictions would destabilize relationships and harm key industries across Canada. During the 2018 NAFTA renegotiations, even the spectre of a trade breakdown cost Canadian industries millions in lost revenue and opportunities. A full-blown trade war would magnify these damages exponentially.

Alberta's oil and gas sector is the backbone of the provincial economy and a vital contributor to Canada's prosperity. In 2023, Alberta exported \$127 billion worth of oil and gas to the U.S., representing 82 per cent of its energy exports. This sector accounts for 27 per cent of Alberta's GDP and contributes approximately \$28,863 per capita to the provincial economy.

Halting these exports would be devastating to a weakened economy. Alberta's energy industry supports tens of thousands of jobs and generates substantial government revenues that fund social programs and infrastructure. Alberta is also a net contributor to federal equalization payments, providing billions annually to support less prosperous provinces, including Quebec.

The suggestion that Alberta should stop exporting oil and gas to "do its part" for Canada is economically nonsensical. Unlike Quebec's electricity sector, Alberta's energy industry has no immediate alternative markets to replace U.S. demand. Shutting off the tap to America would devastate Alberta and weaken Canada.

In contrast, Quebec's hydroelectric sector, though significant, plays a smaller role in its economy than oil and gas does in Alberta. In 2022, Hydro-Québec exported \$3 billion worth of electricity to the U.S., representing about 12 per cent of its total electricity production and 2.9 per cent of its GDP. With a population of 8.6 million, these exports amount to \$349 per capita.

While losing U.S. electricity exports

would hurt Quebec, the economic impact would be far less severe than Alberta's potential losses. Quebec's export economy is more diversified, with industries such as aerospace, aluminum, pharmaceuticals and technology providing alternative revenue streams.

The notion that Alberta and Quebec will equally shoulder the burden of a trade war by withholding energy sales to the United States is deeply flawed. Alberta's reliance on the U.S. market is far greater, and its potential losses are higher. This is partly because Quebec objected to Energy East, the proposed pipeline to carry Alberta energy to Atlantic waters. Halting oil and gas exports would cost Alberta almost 10 times more per capita than it would cost

This asymmetry highlights the uneven stakes in any trade conflict. Asking Alberta to sacrifice its economy while Quebec faces minor losses is unfair, economically irrational and deeply corrosive to national unity. Undermining Alberta's economy would have repercussions far beyond the province's borders.

Far from being "anti-Canadian," as those with a political agenda to hurt Alberta suggest, the province's reluctance to dismantle its energy sector is a defence of Canada's broader economic interests. Alberta's contributions to federal revenues and equalization payments help sustain national programs that benefit all Canadians. Conversely, Quebec's relative insulation from the harmful consequences of a trade war explains its more relaxed stance.

For Quebec, halting exports would be akin to a paper cut, whereas, for Alberta, it would be a lethal wound.

Canada's strength lies in its economic diversity and regional contributions. Alberta's oil and gas sector, Quebec's hydroelectric industry, Atlantic fisheries and Ontario's manufacturing base are all critical to the country's prosperity.

A trade war would disrupt this relationship and risk Canada's position as a stable and reliable trading partner. Alberta Premier Danielle Smith alone has offered a mature and reasonable approach.

The idea of a trade war with the U.S. is reckless when Canada's government is in stasis and already mired in the economic problems it created. Rather than pitting provinces against one another, Ottawa—and the premiers spoiling for a fight—should focus on preserving a proven key to our prosperity: strengthening its relationship with the United States.

## **Future Parking Plan for YCE Multiplex**

In the summer of 2024, the Town of Edson conducted public engagement with information sessions and a parking survey for the YCE Multiplex project. The feedback received was invaluable and taken into consideration as the final parking plan was developed. The final parking layout takes into account important factors such as preserving park/treed space, pedestrian safety, residential parking impacts, construction cost, and proper traffic flows.

As outlined in the above graphic, the new parking layout would include 310 total parking spaces (currently the EDLC has approximately 165 stalls).

The main parking would be on the northwest corner of the facility with additional parking lots to the north (pool/gym areas) and south (arenas).

48th Street would be changed to one-way traffic (southbound) and additional angle parking would be made available on the east side of the street.

A new main parking lot will be constructed on the north-west corner and along the north side. The natural flow from the main parking lot would move around to the east side of the facility into the new parking spaces.

Access to the new lobby would be on both from the west (main entrance) and east side (secondary entrance) of the facility. The south parking spaces will remain with some adjustments on the southwest corner of the existing parking lot with access near the south-west end (secondary entrance) of the facility. This parking design will convert 48th Street into a one-way south bound between 10th -12th Avenue.



Grande Yellowhead Public School Division coordinates bussing for both School Divisions, and the Transportation Department is aware of these changes and planning accordingly. No physical changes are expected until after the current school year concludes. The construction schedule for implementing these parking and roadway changes is still under consideration, and once confirmed, a more detailed implementation plan and timeline will be announced.

The Town of Edson and the YCE Multiplex committee would like to thank everyone that participated in the parking engagement. "It was through this process that generated new ideas that were taken into consideration in the final design. While we understand it may not hit the mark with everyone, we believe it strikes the right balance for the priorities identified during the engagement process and the needs of the new facility.

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
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
