Edson RCMP investigation leads to an arrest and charge of breaking and entering

(RCMP) On Aug. 22, 2022 at 09:13 a.m., Edson RCMP received a report of a break and enter at a local restaurant.

The suspects were successful at breaking into the safe in the manager's office as well as the ATM on the main floor.

Edson RCMP as well as the RCMP Forensic Identification Section attended the location and completed a thorough investigation at the scene.

Through evidence gathered at the restaurant and with the assistance from the public, in mid October, one suspect was identified and was arrested for this crime.

A 41 year old male resident of Alberta Beach was charged with Breaking and Entering. The suspect was released on an undertaking and is scheduled to appear at the Edson Provincial Court on Dec. 6, 2022.

The Edson RCMP is still investigating the possibility that this person did not act alone and is asking for anyone with information in regards to this crime to contact the Edson RCMP.

Municipal government register as lobbyists?

United Conservative Party members want all municipal politicians and employees to register as lobbyists if they have any dealings with provincial officials.

At the UCP's annual convention on October 20, party members voted in favour of a resolution to require municipal representatives to register as lobbyists if they're in touch with the provincial government.

This means Mayors, Town and County CAO's, and staff would be required to register as lobbyists. Then, before speaking to any elected official like an MLA or a provincial civil servant, they would need to indicate who will be doing the lobbying, what ministries they will be contacting, and what topics they will be communicating about.

By definition, the current Act states municipal civil servants are not lobbyists. "A member of a council or other statutory body charged with the administration of the civic or municipal affairs of a municipality, or an individual on their staff" —are not lobbyists.

Now, UCP resolutions are not bills, and bills are not legislation —but each can be very short stepping stones to laws. And this new stone is particularly concerning for local government.

Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara said, "Such a move would create further divisions between levels of government at a time when we need to be working together."

"Elected officials should be able to talk to each other without layers of bureaucracy in the way. Lobbying legislation is in place for those who are trying to get contracts or funding/legislation changes for private interests. We are elected by people and represent our constituents, not private business interests," Mayor

Zahara stated. "What is going to be next? Residents have to register to speak with their elected representatives?" The UCP resolution seems to apply a ponderous red-tape solution, without a problem. "It [municipalities] should require to be held to the highest standards of accountability and transparency in all areas of their activities/operations and exercise of their judgment and authority..."

As a journalist, editor, and publisher I have been covering municipal council meetings for over 30 years. And in my experience, municipal councils (albeit not perfect) are extraordinarily better at accountability and transparency than their provincial counterparts —and far better at responding to journalist inquiries.

A peculiar example of this is an unprecedented email we received last week from Premier Danielle Smith's office asking about removing The Weekly Anchor as a listed "publication interested in media opportunities engaging with the Premier and Cabinet Ministers for your articles and stories". We can not fathom why a Premier's office would ask about closing down communications with any rural Alberta newspaper, particularly one with our substantial readership. Of course we asked to remain on the list!

"Municipalities are the creation of the province through legislation. To have legislation in place restricting access to municipal representatives makes zero sense and would only create a further narrative that the government is not interested in working with municipalities. Our communities are stronger when we work together," concluded Mayor Zahara.



- 1. Rinse** Use a chemical handler or a pressure nozzle to triple-rinse the containers to ensure no product is wasted

 - Place rinsed containers in a Clean Farms collection bag
 - Tie bag closed
- 3. Return for recycling**
 - Return rinsed and bagged jugs to your participating ag retailer
- 4. Seed treatment containers**
 - Caps are to remain securely ON
 - Place in a separate collection bag (seed treatment containers are processed separately from chemical containers and need to be kept in their own bags)

Black Knot Info & Pruning Guideline



Black Knot - What Is It?

Yellowhead County's Agricultural Services Department has received numerous calls regarding black growths on residents' fruit trees.

These tar-like black swellings are a sign of Black Knot and will distort and stunt any tree species within the *Prunus* genus.

Black Knot reduces the aesthetic value of affected trees and, if left long enough, may result in eventual death of the tree.

The disease spreads in the spring, attacking new growth on branches. The spores released by the fungi can be carried by wind and splashing rain.

The only reliable method of controlling Black Knot is pruning.

Edson Rotary did their 3rd Dirty Hands project, this time down in the Philippines. The goal of the Dirty Hands project is to give Edson youth an opportunity to travel internationally, experience true poverty, make long-term improvements, work hard, get their hands dirty, and appreciate service above self.

The group that went to the Philippines for the Dirty Hands project consisted of adult Rotarians Troy Sorensen, Josie Sorensen, and Chad

Dickson, along with six youths Max Steffler, Ethan Breault, Kyle Dickson, Kieran Bradbury, Kaiden Rwand and Jakob Sorensen.

Troy Sorensen gave a slide show presentation during Rotary's 25th Anniversary night that took place at the Galloway Station Museum and Travel Centre on September 29th. The slideshow contained photos showing all the things the group did while in the Philippines.

Sorensen said, "the youth fundraised their own travel expenses

with bottle drives, hot dog sales, and GoFundMe. The Rotary club paid for all capital improvements in the Philippines. The local Rotary club partnered with several Rotary clubs in the Philippines to plan travel and construction logistics. One of the huge benefits of Rotary International is that we have a network of millions of Rotarians willing to help on any project and ensure safety in any area of the world."

The group visited a Alangan Mangyan tribe, and indigenous village of 400 people in the mountains of Mindoro island. The tribe suffered several consecutive typhoons and mud slides in 2020, wiping out their permanent water supply. The trip lasted two weeks and the group experienced many recreational and cultural activities. The group oversaw the completion of several improvements to the village including the construction of two concrete water reservoirs and over 2km of water line to the village. They constructed a handwashing station for the village school, painted its interior, constructed a washroom for teachers, replaced broken doors, and planted mahogany saplings as a future investment in the village.

"The Filipino community has been such a positive addition to Edson, and we wanted to thank them in some way. The group would like to thank the following companies for supporting the project, Mountain Pizza & Steak House, Lucky Mart, Aurora Eye Care, Elevated Wire Line Ltd, The Other Side Hair Studio and Henry Family Vision," said Sorensen. It is great that youth have the opportunity to have this kind of experience.

(AHS) Getting immunized against influenza and COVID-19 is the best way to protect yourself and your community. Vaccines help make your immune system stronger and help build antibodies.

Keeping the number of influenza cases and outbreaks low can help protect ourselves as well as at-risk Albertans and reduce the pressure on our healthcare system.

Influenza is an infection of the nose, throat, and lungs that is caused by a virus. Symptoms start suddenly and may include:

- a fever and chills
- a sore throat or cough
- a headache
- muscle aches
- poor appetite
- feeling tired

Other symptoms may include feeling sick to your stomach (nausea), vomiting (throwing up), or having loose stool (diarrhea). These symptoms are more common in young children. In some cases, influenza can lead to a lung infection (pneumonia) or make other health problems worse. Even healthy, young people can get very sick or die from influenza.

It is important to get the influenza vaccine each year if you:

- have a high risk for influenza
- have close contact with someone who has a high risk, such as family members and caregivers
- are a healthcare provider (it helps protect you and the people you care for)

Immunization, combined with good hygiene, physical distancing, masking and staying home when sick, help prevent the spread of influenza and other respiratory illnesses

Alberta saw 2,906 cases of seasonal influenza last year, with more than 1.2 million doses of influenza vaccine administered.

Influenza vaccines are available to Albertans six months of age and older, free of charge. AHS encourages all Albertans over the age of five to also get their COVID-19 immunization primary series or booster shot when booking their influenza immunization appointment.

Visit Alberta's Vaccine Booking System , call 811 or your local pharmacist to book an appointment. Some family doctors are also offering flu shots. Call ahead to confirm vaccine availability.




Director Murphy praised the group for their range of "super powers" and provided a space where the different strengths and skills of the sub-teams were explored across different contexts.

Alberta and U.S. cattle price spreads

“The week ending October 14, 2022 saw minimal buyer bidding on live fed steers in Alberta,” says Ann Boyda, provincial livestock market analyst with Agriculture and Irrigation. “A weekly price trend was not available. The prior week did see a modest increase of \$.24/cwt on fed steers in comparison to Nebraska's increase of \$Cdn2.75/cwt. The price spread between the 2 markets was \$20.59/cwt under.”

The 5-year average prices of these 2 price series shows a closer alignment. The spot basis (difference between the cash price and the nearby futures price) is estimated to be \$18.50/cwt under. The same week in 2021 reported a spot basis of approximately \$2/cwt over. Why the deviation? Is the Alberta cattle market out of sync with the U.S. market?

“There are a number of factors influencing recent cattle markets, starting with narrowing packer margins,” says Boyda. “Packer margins are closer to average versus the higher levels of the recent year. Demand is keeping throughput moving but last week there were insufficient bids to register a trend in fed steer prices. Listings are now into November.”

Tighter supplies in the U.S. are putting U.S. packers in the red. HedgersEdge.com reported beef packers losses of \$US14.35/head on October 11, 2022, down from earnings of \$US18.40/head the week before.

“The U.S. is keeping cattle processing current but this may not be the case in Alberta. Commercial red meat production for the U.S. totaled 4.83 billion pounds in August, up 5% from August 2021. Cattle slaughter totaled 3.08 million

head, up 7% from August 2021.”

The average live weight was down 6 pounds from the previous year. U.S. packers are processing cattle at a greater pace than that of the last 2 years. In comparison, according to data from the Canadian Beef Grading Agency, Alberta steer carcass weights have increased to 953 pounds in September 2022, approximately 20 pounds higher than September 2021. Heavier weights and longer delivery schedules suggest that the Alberta processing is still not current.

“The weaker basis levels may encourage holding feeders longer; however rising costs of gain need to be considered. Barley prices have risen every week since the last week in August 2022, from \$359.50 to \$431.50/tonne based in Lethbridge.”


The pull for cattle is not as strong as earlier in the year, notes Boyda. Weekly slaughter for the West Region on the week of October 8, 2022 was 49,234 head, 8.9% lower than the same week in 2021, but equivalent in terms of year-to-date over 2021. The Canadian Beef Grading Agency reported the first quarter slaughter volume of 2022 as 5.5% higher than that of the same period in 2021. By the third quarter of 2022, slaughter volumes were 4.8% lower than the same quarter in 2021.

Finally, Alberta beef exports to key markets slipped in August 2022. Beef (fresh, frozen or chilled, including offal) export volume in August was 32.2 tonnes, 9.9% lower than the previous month and 16.8% lower than August 2021.

The value of beef exports in August 2022 was \$286.1 million, a drop of 9.2% from July 2022 and

a decrease of 24% over August 2021. 2022 started strong but the key markets of U.S. and Japan saw a decline in August. Although Canada remains the top beef supplier to the U.S., Brazil and Mexico have made inroads and U.S. beef imports increased by 8.6% over 2022.

“Recession concerns are pervasive. The global economy may be in a worse position than Canada finds itself and that too has impacts. The U.S. cattle market is likely to see continued high prices as it continues into its liquidation phase of the cattle cycle. The drought in the U.S. and tight supplies will contribute to the price pressure. The strong U.S. dollar and strong demand ahead of the holiday season should provide some support to Alberta prices in the fourth quarter of 2022,” says Boyda. - AgriNews
