

EDSON REMEMBERS

The 2022 Remembrance Day Service at the Royal Canadian Legion Joe Wynne Branch 51 in Edson was once again held inside the auditorium. After the traditional parade, around 300 people attended the service including Veterans, service groups, and families.

The color party was led by Sergeant-at-arms John Wesley Coes. At 11:00 am the last post was played by Ryan Wensing, followed by Two Minutes of Silence. Branch President, Wendy Williams then recited the Act of Remembrance, "They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old; Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn; At the going down of the sun, and in the morning: We will remember them." The crowd responded, "We will remember them."

The program also included addresses from Branch President Wendy Williams and Ladies Auxiliary President Sherry Wassing. The Lament and Amazing Grace were performed by the Edson Pipe and Drums. Laying of the wreaths took place at the inside Cenotaph – with the participants being escorted by Legion representatives and members of the 874 Tiger Moth Cadet Squadron. RCMP Chaplain Brian Walter did the scripture reading, followed by a prayer read by Ladies Auxiliary member Erin Wassing. Erin Wassing also read the poem 'In Flanders Fields' by Canadian physician Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae. The official service ended with the singing of God Save the King, a first for many present, and the marching off of the colors.

First Vice President, Bobbi Foulds said," Today we stand in recognition of those who have gone

"It was great to see Edsonites of all ages taking part in the ceremonies," said Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara. "With the ongoing conflict in Ukraine, the ceremony hits much closer to home for many. We shall never forget the sacrifices so many have made for the freedoms we enjoy today. Thank you to the Royal Canadian Legion and all the volunteers who organized the November 11th ceremony."

Yellowhead County Deputy Mayor Dawn Mitchell spoke on behalf of the county. Mitchell is also the secretary/treasurer of the Ladies Auxiliary.

Donations to the Parkland Lodge Auxiliary were presented by the Branch as well as the Ladies Auxiliary to representative Ivan Strang. Strang also spoke on behalf of MLA Martin Long.

Service pins were awarded to members with length of service ranging from 5-55 years. Wally Coes was the recipient of a 55-year pin.

The final award of the day was the Legionnaire of the year. This award went to Ryan DeRoche. Candidates for this award are nominated by members and chosen by a committee. The candidate should be a member in good standing that has shown exemplary commitment to the branch, going above and beyond their contributing duties. 



The longer a child is bullied, the more likely they are to develop physical, emotional, and

psychological scars that can last a lifetime.

With Anti-Bullying initiatives taking place throughout November, it's time to promote awareness and understanding of bullying, its forms, and its impacts.

Bullying is a conscious, wilful, deliberate, hostile, and repeated behaviour by one or more people, which is intended to harm others. It can take on many forms including physical, emotional, gender, verbal, cyber, peer exclusion, and more.

According to Bullying Canada, "Bullying can be devastating -leaving children withdrawn, shy, and insecure. Kids frequently suffer stomach aches, headaches, panic attacks, and nightmares. They can become unable to sleep – or may sleep too much. They often do poorly in school due to loss of focus and confidence or erratic attendance as they try to escape the bullying. When unrelenting, bullying can even lead children to take their own lives. Bullying also hurts bystanders, who may become fearful that they will also be victimized."

The devastating impact of cyberbullying is that there's no reprieve. Cyberbullying is available for the whole world to see. It transcends school buildings and can follow a victim even after they have moved, enrolled in a new school, or started a new job. This type of bullying has no physical boundaries.



In spite of the fact that nearly half of teens have been victims of some form of cyberbullying, and

88% have witnessed online attacks toward others ---many parents are not aware of the full extent of the problem.


Research from the Light organization and others shows cyberbullying has increased as much as 70% over recent years. They also found a 40% increase in toxicity on online gaming platforms, and a 900% increase in hate speech on 'social' apps like Twitter.

With a growing number of Alberta students are home sick with the flu, COVID-19 or RSV, and cases are trend upwards. This is putting everyone, including students, on edge. The result is that hostility toward others tends to increase along with the self-defensive behaviours that often feed into and escalate cyberbully attacks.

Laws are slowly catching up to technology, and some forms of online bullying are now considered criminal acts. Under the Criminal Code of Canada, it is a crime to communicate repeatedly with someone if your communication causes them to fear for their own safety or the safety of others.

However, with kids online more than ever before, the best way right now to put an end to cyberbullying is to tell a trusted adult, parent, caregiver, or teacher it happening.

The Bullying Helpline (1-888-456-2323) is available 24/7 in over 170 languages.

WHAT TO KNOW: As part of a province-wide initiative, Starting January 1, 2023, Ag jugs will no longer be accepted at Yellowhead **County Transfer Stations: Peers, Parkcourt** (Evansburg), and Wildwood.

Minister of Seniors, Community and Social Services Jeremy Nixon and Minister of Education Adriana LaGrange issued the following statement to recognize Bullying Awareness 2022:

"Bullying Awareness [this November] is an important opportunity to take action and stop bullying in all its forms. This year, the province has adopted the theme #BeKindAB to emphasize the importance of simply being kind.

"Bullying can happen to anyone, anywhere. Whether it be at school, the office, online, in the community or even at home, bullying can leave long-lasting, damaging effects. That is why it's so important to learn how to recognize bullying and learn the skills to prevent it. "Everyone deserves to feel safe wherever they are. Being kind leaves a positive lasting effect that benefits the community. Alberta is home to so many deeply caring people, which is how we know Albertans will step up to the plate to help stop bullying.

"One of the most common forms of bullying is cyberbullying. Albertans young and old can be targets, which is why it's important to know where to turn when you experience or witness it. By learning how to better support those who suffer from bullying, we can expect to see a positive culture change in our communities.

"If you need help or know someone who does, resources can be found at alberta.ca/Bullying. Help

Teach your child how to respond to cyberbullying

Open up a discussion with your child about cyberbullying. It's the best way to show them you think it's important to their lives – and will make it easier for them to come to you in the future:

Ask your child if they've ever seen any kind of cyberbullying and let them tell you about it. Learn what sites your child uses and what accounts they have. If you haven't already, start setting some ground rules with your child about their online activity. Insist your child use privacy settings. Social networking sites let users control who sees the information they share.

Let your child know you may take action if there's reason for concern. Tell them it's part of your job to keep them safe, and if you feel there's a risk, you may monitor their online communication. Encourage them to create different passwords for different sites and to never share their passwords with friends. A child can become a target of cyberbullying without ever expecting it. It can happen suddenly. You can help your child by teaching them in advance what to do should it ever happen to them.


Do not respond to the cyberbullying. Let your child know that kids that bully crave attention, and replying to them gives them more power. If your child receives a bullying message, teach them not to engage and not to openly show their emotions with those doing the bullying in person if they're people they see in real life.

Do not retaliate, keep a record of everything, tell someone. It's possible that your child may not choose to share with you if they do become a target of cyberbullying. Provide them in advance with alternate sources of information (like NeedHelpNow.ca) where they can learn how to deal with others and how to have pictures/videos removed from the Internet. And, of course, encourage them to come to you if they ever become a target of bullying. Children often feel a parent may make a situation worse, rather than better. Assure them you won't 'freak out'; that your concern is to keep them safe.

Town finalizes Fees and Charges Bylaw

During the November 15 Town Council meeting, Bylaw 2283 received its final reading and has officially passed.

The bylaw, also known as the Fees and Charges Bylaw, outlines the various costs for services owned and/or operated by the Town. According to the Town's Council notes, "Each year this bylaw is reviewed and adjusted to reflect current procedures, move towards cost recovery, and to better line up with industry best practices."

The new rates will go into effect on January 1st and some of the key changes include:

Business Licence fees adjustments – Inclusion of Temporary Business Licences and other changes based on the new Business Licence Bylaw passed on October 4, 2022.

Landfill – Construction / Demo Material Fees increase from \$50 to \$61/tonne.

Cemetery – Addition of a Secondary Niche Plaque fee of \$75.

Water – Rate adjusted from 1.47 to $1.94/m^3$.

Sewer – Rate adjusted from \$1.51 to \$1.94/m3.

With the utility fee changes, the average residential consumer can expect to see an approximate monthly increase of \$19.09. The average non-residential consumer will see an approximate monthly increase of \$19.20.

These adjustments will bring in an estimated \$191,250 in additional revenues for the Town, and Administration plans on allocating the new income to the Water AMP Reserve to aid in the planning and development of Edson's water infrastructure repairs and updates.

A motion was also passed directing Administration to explore a full capital cost recovery rate model and bring forward a report to Council highlighting their findings and potential implementation steps.

Town's 2023 Draft Budget moves to final review

After months of preparing, talking with the public, and drafting plans, the 2023 draft budget for the Town of Edson was put up for review..

During the November 15 Town council meeting, Administration presented the semifinal draft for discussion and review by Council. This year's budget was put together following a lengthy evaluation process and multiple hours of discussion between Administration and Council.

The 2023 budget comes in two parts. The Operating Budget which factors in the individual budgets needed for the various departments and their operation. This

includes everything from salaries and human resources to the landfill and Parks and Recreation.

The Capital Budget lays out the costs for large scale projects for improvement and maintenance of town infrastructure. The proposed leisure centre renovations would fall under this category for example, as would the repairs for the town water system.


A d m i n i s t r a t i o n presented the draft 2023 Operating Budget to Council on October 15, 2022; a revised version incorporating Council's requested adjustments was brought forward on November 1, 2022, at which time no additional changes were directed. Based on these adjustments the total increase was

forecasted to be 8.25%. This number was reached by combining the base budget with service changes and requests as well as Council requests.

The draft Capital Budget includes 46 projects: 2 projects which may flow through the Operating Budget, 2 projects with deferred funding for future highway projects, 11 carryover projects from 2022, and 31 new projects for 2023. The total of these projects comes to \$31,240,645. \$23,767,900 of that will come from grants, \$7,433,220 from the Town of Edson Reserves, and finally, \$39,525 from different Cost-Sharing Partners for specific projects.

As part of the acceptance process,

council voted for the budget to be put forward for approval at a future Council Meeting. The exact date of this meeting is undetermined. The proposed draft budget could still undergo changes before adoption.

Community Care Foundation fundraising for additional cataract suite equipment

During Yellowhead County's Governance and Priorities meeting on November 15, the Community Care Foundation of Edson & District requested support for the O p h t h a l m o l o g y

Program at the Edson hospital. The presentation was made by their president, Ruth Martin-Williams.

Martin-Williams advocated for the need of addition equipment for the cataract surgery suite at the Edson hospital. This would enable patients to have their pre-operative assessment in Edson. Currently patients must travel to Sherwood Park, she stated.

"Everybody had to go to Edmonton for [cataract] surgery and it increased the wait time for many surgeries up to two, three years. With cataract surgery now in Edson we are able to do it in about two and a half weeks." Over 560 people have had surgery at the new clinic since

2021.

"What we don't have for cataract surgery or any other additional special surgeries at any of the hospitals in the province is equipment, and that's where Community Care Foundations come in," she stated. Unlike AHS, Community Care Foundations are able to issue tax receipts for donations.

'Rather than having to drive to Sherwood Park to have the assessment done," where wait times are up to 3 hours, "we want to have these assessments done in Edson," said Martin-Williams.

She stated that the surgeon is prepared to complete the preoperative assessment in

Edson, but requires the following equipment: an IOL master and a macular OCT machine. totalling approximately \$150,000. Martin-Williams requested the financial support of the County.

The cataract surgery suite's catchment area extends to all of Yellowhead County, west to McBride in BC, and north past Grande Cache. Martin-Williams stated they will also be asking the other communities for donations.


Mayor Wade Williams thanked Martin-Williams for the presentation. Council passed a motion to request Administration to return the request to a future council meeting for deliberation.


