new expanded trail system, reaching out further than ever before.

After navigating the trails, people could make their way over to a variety of other activities. A traditional bake sale was set up selling candy, hot chocolate, popcorn and more. There was a kids' activity area with multiple carnival style games, a leaf pit for kids to have fun in, and a movie playing for all to enjoy. Also new this year were the adopt a stuffy and the glitter tattoo booth. Finally, when the night got bit chilly, there was a bonfire burning bright all night long.

EARS does their best to make sure the Haunted Forest is fun for all ages. Thursday was the Little

Goblin Glow in the Dark Night with glow sticks and no jump scares for the younger audience. In the same way, the first hour of the 27th and 28th were 'scaredy-cat' hours, also with no active scarers. The rest of the nights, however, there were plenty spooky scares for older kids and adults to enjoy.

This year proved quite successful, with even the snowy Thursday having over 300 people in attendance. Friday and Saturday saw around 1,700 people come through. "We get people who come from Hinton or Whitecourt that always make the trip out. It's nice that people appreciate it and think it's worthwhile to come out. And aside from them enjoying it, a lot of people are very generous as well. It's good for us and good for the community at

large," said Lisa Wilkinson, EARS board member and fundraiser coordinator.

The fundraiser is entirely put on by volunteers for EARS. Set up and planning for the Haunted Forest begins as early as September to get everything in place for the big weekend. "It takes a lot of volunteer hours to put it on," said Wilkinson, "We couldn't do it without the support of volunteers and local businesses, and we really approach it that people come out and support our events and give generously."

The next EARS fundraiser will be the 'Photos with Santa' event in late November. This will also serve as their monthly adoption event, so keep an eye out for more details coming soon.

Highway Adjacent Sidewalk Clearing



Attention Property Owners along 2nd and 4th Avenue

Recognizing the challenge posed by increased snow accumulation along the highway corridor due to snow plowing and traffic volume, Town of Edson Council has approved a service level enhancement regarding sidewalk snow clearing for improved safety and community walkability.

Key Points:

1. Sidewalks along 2nd and 4th Avenue will now be cleared by the town, reducing the responsibility for adjacent property owners and enhancing the safety and walkability of our community.
2. Sidewalks will be cleared within 72 hours after a snow event, in line with the Sidewalk, Facility, and Trail Snow and Ice Control Policy C-S-9.
3. A temporary contractor has been hired for this service as we finalize the policy implementation.


Please ensure snow from your properties isn't stored on public boulevards, sidewalks or roadways.

2024 FORTIS FRANCHISE FEE DECREASE NOTICE

Please be advised that the Town of Edson is proposing to decrease the local access fee, which is charged to FortisAlberta Inc. (FortisAlberta) for the use of municipal lands for its power lines effective January 1, 2024. This fee is recovered by FortisAlberta from its customers as the local municipal access fee on electric billings of all customers that receive electric service in the Town.

As a percentage this local access fee will be decreased in 2024 from 4.91% to 4.70%. Which shall result in a decrease in the 2024 typical residential monthly charge of \$0.16 (decreasing from \$3.73 to \$3.57) on the delivery charge collected by FortisAlberta, excluding energy related riders. This calculation is based on typical residential consumption of 640 kWh in 30 days.

Statement on Petition e-4460 and Bill C-336, Noah's Law

OTTAWA, ON – Members of Parliament Blaine Calkins, Gerald Soroka, Damien

Kurek, and Senator Pierre-Hugues Boisvenu, hereby issue the following statement:

“Bill C-336, known as Noah's Law, represents a significant piece of legislation designed to bolster the safety of vulnerable Canadians, with a particular emphasis on women and children. This bill aims to accomplish this by introducing critical amendments to both the Criminal Code and the Sex Offender Registry Act.

"In response to MP Gerald Soroka's introduction of Bill C-336, MP Blaine Calkins has presented Petition e-4460 in the House of Commons. This petition has garnered substantial support, with nearly 22,000 Canadians fervently urging the Government of Canada to promptly address the deficiencies in the justice system.

"Petition e-4460 specifically calls for the implementation of the following provisions outlined in Bill

C-336: “Mandatory Reporting Requirements: Establish

mandatory reporting requirements for convicted sexual offenders whenever they change their place of residence.

“Failure to Comply as an Offense: Specify that the failure to comply with these reporting obligations constitutes an offense, resulting in the issuance of an arrest warrant.

“Dedicated Classification for Offenders: Create a dedicated classification for offenders who have been convicted of sexual assault offenses against children and received sentences exceeding two years or those convicted of two or more violent sexual offenses or offenses involving the abduction of women and/or children.

"The urgency of this proposed legislation cannot be overstated. Canada's justice system necessitates immediate action to address its shortcomings and safeguard the most vulnerable members of our society."

(GNS) GYPSED's Indigenous Pathways Lead Teachers participated in an Indigenous Foundational Knowledge learning experience on October 6, hosted by Dr. Dwayne Donald from the University of Alberta and Kehteya Bob Cardinal of the Enoch Cree Nation on Kehteya Cardinal's ceremonial lands.

The day began in the Teaching Lodge, learning with and from Kehteya Cardinal, followed by a ceremonial sweat. A group of young adults and their mentor from the area assisted Dr. Donald with preparing for the ceremonial sweat experience.

This involved heating lava rock in a fire, preparing the willow branches and water for the ceremony, and

assisting during the ceremony with replenishing the hot stones and tending to the needs of the participants inside the lodge. The group then enjoyed a traditional moose stew, bannock, and tea meal.

The objective of the experience was to "begin the year in a good way"; participants were invited to set personal and professional intentions that will guide their work for the coming school year.

This unique and one-of-a-kind learning experience supports and aligns with the Division's priority of providing opportunities for staff to deepen their foundational knowledge about First Nations, Métis and Inuit for the benefit of all students and staff.



Edson RCMP arrest and charge local male with drug trafficking

(RCMP) During the months of September and October 2023, the Edson RCMP General Investigation Section (GIS) conducted an operation to combat drug trafficking in Edson.

On Oct. 5, 2023, the Edson RCMP identified a male suspect involved in trafficking fentanyl in the area. Thanks to various investigative techniques, the male was observed selling drugs and was subsequently arrested.

A male (52), a resident of Edson, was charged

with unlawfully trafficking a controlled substance, contrary to section 5(1) of the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act. The accused was released from custody and is to appear at the Alberta Court of Justice in Edson on Dec. 19, 2023.



Remembering the loss...

November 11th is a day to remember those who served and fought for our country. Many lives were tragically lost, and those who came back were left with the impact of seeing and going through so much.

Canadians recognize Remembrance Day on November 11 and at 11 a.m. we take 2 minutes of silence to remember those who have passed as well to thank those veterans still with us.

Remembrance Day is observed on 11 November to recall the end of First World War hostilities. Hostilities formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

Sadly, this war to end all wars was not to be the last.

Corporal Raymond Arndt who grew up in the Peers and Edson area was killed while proudly serving our country in Afghanistan.

On August 5, 2006. Master Corporal Raymond Arndt, aged 31 at the time, was a reservist with Loyal Edmonton Regiment, based in Edmonton, Alberta. He was killed in a head-on collision involving a large cargo truck and the G-wagon he was riding in.

The incident occurred during a re-supply convoy delivering medical supplies to the Canadian Forward Operating Base at Spin Boldak, on the

Afghan-Pakistan border, about 35 kilometres southeast of Kandahar.

Master Corporal Raymond Arndt was a very good soldier according to his relatives. He was very dedicated, hardworking, and he loved to smile and tell jokes.

Walter Arndt, Raymond's father in Edson said, "A loss like this hits us all hard. He was a loving husband, son, brother, uncle, and friend. Ray had a love for life and for his family, and had a wonderful sense of humour. Ray was proud of who he was and of the work he was doing in Afghanistan."

Master Corporal Raymond Arndt was known in many different ways and to so many people. He was described as an incredible friend, very generous, fun, outgoing and charismatic, logical, and loud. "He had a wonderful way of making a person feel like the most important person in the world."

Raymond was born in Hinton and grew up in Peers. He attended all his schooling in Edson. At a young age Raymond had a love for the army as he was a member of the Edson Cadets for a number of years.

Every year Raymond's dad lays a wreath for the Afghanistan fallen at the Edson Legion's Remembrance Day Service.




