Ribbon Cutting for Glenwood Park Revitalization Project

The Town of Edson is thrilled to officially open the Glenwood Park Recreation Facility. A ribbon cutting ceremony was held today to mark the completion of the project.

Mayor Kevin Zahara said, "Glenwood Park is a well utilized area of our community. Council has had a vision of making some of our neighbourhood rinks more year-round facilities to enhance the quality of life for our residents. An opportunity was brought forward by our Community Services Manager to apply for a grant to do just that and we were successful."

"We have already seen wide use of the space late this summer and we are thrilled that we have this enhancement in Glenwood. We are now working with some community volunteers to enhance a rink in Westhaven and will be looking at other opportunities throughout the community to improve these facilities. A lot of great things can happen when we partner together and look for grant opportunities. It all aligns with Council's Strategic Plan," Zahara added.

Thanks to the Federal investment of \$326,250 through the Canada Community Revitalization Fund, a series of transformative upgrades at Glenwood Park were brought to life. The overarching vision was to create a space for recreation in that neighbourhood that is vibrant, accessible, and inclusive.

Key Highlights:

Facility Upgrades: One of the major initiatives was the replacement of the wooden arena boards at the outdoor rink, making way for a cutting-edge multi-use facility with a cement base. This space will serve the community throughout the year, accommodating activities such as skating, basketball, pickleball, fitness classes, and more. A wheelchair accessible picnic space was also included on the perimeter of the rink.

Project Benefits: Beyond rejuvenating the aging infrastructure of Glenwood Park, the project will cater to individuals across all age groups and abilities. The modern design will enable the Parks team to flood the rink sooner during winter, prolonging the outdoor skating season. The revamped arena has already become a hub of activity throughout the summer months.

Canada Community Revitalization Fund (CCRF): The CCRF is a two-year, \$500 million national infrastructure program to revitalize communities across Canada. The fund assisted non-profit organizations, municipalities, community groups, and Indigenous communities across Canada to build and improve community infrastructure projects. PrairiesCan is

administering the CCRF in Alberta. Federal funding of \$326,250 through CCRF was provided to the Town of Edson for this project, with our community contributing the remaining 25 per cent, or \$108,750.

"We're very happy to see this project come to fruition and have already seen the impact it's going to have on this neighbourhood. Recreational venues are very important to the overall health and wellbeing of a community, and we're thrilled to partner with the Government of Canada on this project," stated Edson Mayor Kevin Zahara.

"Our government's investments through the Canada Community Revitalization Fund are enabling communities across the Prairies to revitalize public spaces into modern, accessible amenities for residents and visitors. Congratulations to the Town of Edson on today's official opening of the Glenwood Park recreation facility as a year-round multi-sport venue that will contribute to the community's high quality of life for years to come," stated the Honourable Dan Vandal, Minister for PrairiesCan.

"Today's grand opening is an important milestone in providing more opportunities for Edson residents and visitors to enjoy accessible and inclusive recreational activities. Our government is making investments to enrich communities across Alberta and ensuring our public spaces remain vibrant and welcoming for people of all ages and abilities," stated the Honourable Randy Boissonnault, Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Official Languages.

This project is directly related to two of Edson Town Council's Strategic Priorities; Creating a Connected Community that is Safe and Inclusive, and Ensuring Quality Infrastructure.

A special thanks went to David Quaschnick from Global Sports Resources/Reward Construction, who were contracted to build the facility; Project Consultant John Buchko from Environmental Design Solutions; and local contractors who worked on the project: McPhee Construction Ltd, Dirt Works Bobcat Services, and WSP.

2024 FORTIS FRANCHISE FEE DECREASE NOTICE

Please be advised that the Town of Edson is proposing to decrease the local access fee, which is charged to FortisAlberta Inc. (FortisAlberta) for the use of municipal lands for its power lines effective January 1, 2024. This fee is recovered by FortisAlberta from its customers as the local municipal access fee on electric billings of all customers that receive electric service in the Town.

As a percentage this local access fee will be decreased in 2024 from 4.91% to 4.70%. Which shall result in a decrease in the 2024 typical residential monthly charge of \$0.16 (decreasing from \$3.73 to \$3.57) on the delivery charge collected by FortisAlberta, excluding energy related riders. This calculation is based on typical residential consumption of 640 kWh in 30 days.

Direct Control District Approvals cannot be appealed.



2023 saw the return of the Galloway Museum, Travel Centre and Archives 'Grave Memories' Old Edson and Glenwood Cemetery tours.

This year the tours took place on October 21 from mid-afternoon to evening. The tours were a prepaid experience with tickets available for purchase online or at the Travel Centre.

This is the first year since 2020 that the cemetery tours have taken place. Before that, they were an annual event that area residents had come to enjoy. As always, the tour began at the Old Edson Cemetery and then caravanned to the Glenwood Cemetery in Edson. New for this year was complimentary hot chocolate provided at the Glenwood Cemetery.

The Old Edson Cemetery (locally known as the Baby Graveyard) is located just outside of Edson. Each year the Galloway asked local historian Christopher White to come out and tell the story of that cemetery. The tour then proceeded to the Glenwood Cemetery where employees from the museum lead people through and shared stories of various people buried there. The group also places flowers on each of the visited graves as a sign of respect.

Each year the guides make a list of stories to tell. "It changes all the time. There are some people that we will generally talk about almost every time, but it's nice to change it out. We're thinking next year of expanding out to the other side of the cemetery. Everyone has a story and everyone deserves to have their story told," said Shari McDowell, Manager at the Galloway Museum.

This year had the highest turnout recorded for the cemetery tours. There were 46 people in attendance. "There was a lot more than we thought, but happily so," said McDowell. "Everyone is really respectful and seem really interested and engaged, so that was great." The team hopes to do the event again next

"At the Moberly Homestead youth learned about Indigenous families that once called Jasper home and the Canadian government's removal of these families. Youth from our community are

100-Year-Old Veteran Remembers the Fallen



100 year old war vet Lloyd Brown reflects on Remembrance Day.

Dear Editor,

I lost my right arm on October 18, 1944, while serving with the Loyal Edmonton Regiment in Italy. I was staked at a farmhouse that had a children's treehouse located nearby. In the treehouse was a sniper who kept shooting at our boys. A tank then came which shot out shells, the shrapnel hitting my right arm.

When I returned home from the war, I joined The War Amps and have been a member ever since. This Association was started by First World War amputee veterans to help each other adapt to their new reality as amputees.

Having just recently turned 100, I am reflecting this Remembrance Day upon all those

who served in my regiment and never returned home. Their absence weighs on me and it is essential that we keep their memory alive. I take comfort in knowing that The War Amps and its young members will continue to keep spreading the message long into the future.

The sacrifices of those who served (and continue to serve) deserve to be remembered and honoured. Each Remembrance Day serves as a poignant reminder of the tremendous price paid by these brave individuals. Their selflessness and courage continue to resonate, and it is our duty to ensure that their legacy endures.

Trudeau-Appointed Senators Vote Against Farmers on Bill C-234



OTTAWA, ON – Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, issued the following statement:

"It is both disappointing and deeply concerning to see Trudeau-appointed Senators taking deliberate steps to undermine Bill C-234, an *Act to amend the Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing*. This bill is designed to exempt Canadian farmers from the federal carbon tax; a common-sense change that would help farmers. These Senators have gone beyond political posturing to playing games with the livelihoods of our farming community.

"By supporting an amendment proposed by Senator Pierre Dagher during the clause-by-clause study at the Senate Committee on Agriculture, these Senators aim to gut Bill C-234 of its core purpose. The amendment, if carried through, will remove the carbon tax exemption for the heating or cooling of agricultural buildings. This action is not only in complete disregard of our hardworking farmers but also serves as an example of how far these Senators are willing to go to jeopardize the well-being of all Canadians.

"The intent behind these amendments is clear: to gut the Bill and send it back to the House of Commons in a form that is unlikely to be passed. This is a calculated move by Trudeau appointed Senators and is especially troubling when Senate Government Representatives involve themselves in the voting of Private Members Bills, which is highly unusual.

"MP Ben Lobb's Bill C-234 is a Common-Sense Conservative plan to exempt the Canadians that put food on our table from this Liberal carbon tax. It aims to provide necessary financial relief to Canadian farmers and their families who have long struggled under the weight of high taxes. By seeking to dismantle this Bill, Trudeau-appointed Senators are not standing up for Canadian farmers or the larger public.

"We remain steadfast in our commitment to defend common sense principles and will continue to fight for policies that prioritize the needs and livelihoods of everyday Canadians over blatant political maneuvering."
